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# HOW THINGS WERE ...

Brigadier Adam
Gurdon, who moved
to Burgh House as a
small boy in 1942, will
be contributing a series
of articles to The News
about 'how things were'
then in Burgh and
Grundisburgh. His first
looks at shopping and
amenities.

Both Grundisburgh and Burgh were very self-sufficient. There was no petrol so forays outside the village were dependent on a good bus service.

The two main shops were Savages, where the Williams' now are, where a portly Mr Lingley ran a grocer and a

post office, and Burch, the butcher. On the corner near the Harvest stores was Mr Lambert the shoemaker. In those days most men wore boots and because,

during the war, they were almost unobtainable, constant repair was essential.

Near the forge was Mr Cotton and his bicycle repair shop, another essential facility for a community almost entirely dependent on bicycles. Mr Gentry's garage at the top of the hill harboured a Rolls-

Royce under dustsheets for the duration. The Pipe family, the basket makers at Pipe's corner, were always busy.

At Burgh, Larkeshayes was the post office and sweet shop run by Mrs Stammers. Mrs Stammers was always giving

away sweets to the children much to the disgust of a very bad tempered old Mr Stammers.

Both The Dog and Half Moon public houses thrived. Both had rooms set aside for women, who were not allowed into the main bar. The Half Moon had no bar so you sat at a table and Mrs

Titshall, the landlord's wife, took your order and brought it to you. Both pubs had very good draughts and domino teams

Both villages had blacksmiths. Mr Crapnal in Grundisburgh and Mr Baxter in Burgh. Apart from the shoeing of horses and ponies they were the only



people who could make metal parts for farm or garden implements. It cost five shillings to shoe a pony.

The only institutions other than St Mary's and St Andrew's (now St Botolph's) churches were the Women's Institute and the primary school. The WI was always a hive of industry during the war. Their hall was in constant use for dances, whist drives and war-associated fundraising.

The school run by Mr Wurr was never less than outstanding and in its old site, very much the centre of village life. The children always walked in the crocodile to the parish room for lunch.

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### **KEEPING HEALTHIER:** LOCAL COMMUNITY **ACTIVITIES**

ne of Grundisburgh's residents is involved with a range of initiatives to improve health, particularly among older people, in the Suffolk Coastal area. Olive Quinton, in her role of Health Improvement Manager, works across both health and Suffolk Coastal District Council services

'Stepping Out in Suffolk', sponsored by Suffolk Coastal, is a healthy walks programme. Its aim is to help people who have become inactive, and often therefore isolated, following medical emergencies, such as strokes and heart attacks, to enjoy walking again. These risk assessed walks start short and

increase in length as the group feels more able, and are led by trained leaders. The walks help lift depression and forge friendships; Olive finds that people who no longer need

supported walks are often reluctant to leave the group behind! She also finds they are often of benefit to recently bereaved people who have become nervous of walking on their own in the countryside.

Anyone interested in joining the walks programme (or becoming a leader!) should contact the Health Walks Team (01394 444501 or Google the Suffolk Coastal District Council website). Olive is hoping to link the walks programme to local GP surgeries.

In addition to the walks Olive is keen to establish local 'falls prevention' classes, aimed at strengthening muscles and improving stability through a series of chair-based exercises. Falls can also result in isolation and depression due to hospitalisation, or being housebound and the subsequent lack of confidence in getting about. A charge of between £1.50 to £2.50 is made for classes to cover the cost of instructors and hall hire. Anyone interested in joining such a class should

contact Olive and she may be able to arrange a 'taster' session.

Another of Olive's projects is the 'GP exercise referral scheme' which is run at local leisure centres, including the Deben Pool in Woodbridge. Each individual's health needs are discussed with a fitness instructor and a

programme of exercise agreed.

Olive's brief enables her to help promote other initiatives such as the 'HeartWise' cardiac rehabilitation class which meets each Friday morning in Melton. People are referred to

this group by Ipswich Hospital or their GP - or may self-refer. Although this costs £6 per session - well worth the money in the opinion of my fellow group members who say they feel real benefit.

Olive grew to love Grundisburgh when she worked for Age Concern Suffolk, then based in the parish rooms. Since marrying into one of the oldest established families three vears ago (Tony is Grundisburgh born and bred) she has become a full time resident.

In terms of the challenge, the guys fell outside the 24 hour target but the conditions were exceptionally appalling. Si says it is the hardest physical thing he has ever done".



### VILLAGE WILDLIFE

would like to say a big I thank you to everyone who participated in the surveys and events run by the environment group this year.

We have had over 25 contributions to the surveys which for a community our size is a great start. The moth evening at the church attracted 35 people, 41 species of moths and 4 species of bat. The surveys have provided some interesting information and a full copy is available from me and will be on the Bredfield Village websites soon.

The garden survey highlighted the wide range of habitats in the village, lots of ponds, wild flower areas, compost bins and mature trees in gardens to attract invertebrates and insects, therefore birds and other

predators including a surprisingly wide range of mammals. There were 58 species of bird recorded, Buzzard being the most notable newcomer whilst swift, house martin and nuthatch numbers seem to have declined. Twenty two species of butterfly were seen including Comma and Purple Hairstreak. Badger and stoat as well as the more common weasel made it onto the list of 15 mammals sharing the village with us.

Should you see anything that you think is unusual or rare in the parish and may not be on the survey please contact me. At the meeting on 28 October it was agreed not to create too formal a structure for the group, so please take part when and if you can any help is always appreciated.

A series of events has been agreed for 2010, probably from May onwards. These will include the ever popular bat evening (to be organised by Peter Tilley), butterfly and bug hunt (Paul Wigens), bat and nest box making (Angela Derham), and a fungi foray (Anne Henderson). Another possibility is a tree walk looking at their history and uses (Paul Wigens/Peter Tilley).

### Travellers' tales at Bealings WI

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## "ON YER BIKE!"

### Bird notes of a local nature from Reg Snook

Several people have commented on the sighting of a lesser spotted woodpecker in Grundisburgh. Quite a number have thought that they too have seen this rare bird. However, most descriptions given have been those of the great spotted woodpecker. There is a great deal of difference between these two species. One positive sighting was that of juvenile birds in Keith Burch's orchard.

That eminent Grundisburgh ornithologist Eddie Marsh thinks the decline of the lesser spotted woodpecker is due to predation by its larger cousin. The great spotted woodpecker will enlarge the holes of the nest boxes in which great tits and blue tits are nesting in order to get at the contents of the nest. Eddie believes that it does the same to Britain's smallest woodpecker, and that is the reason for its disappearance. It is strange to think of 'dendrocopos major' as a predator!

A couple of years or so ago, renovations were carried out to Grundisburgh Baptist Chapel. New boarding was placed under the eaves of the roof, and Colin Grimwood, the pastor, knowing that swifts have traditionally nested in the roof, acquired swift nest boxes from the RSPB to replace the supposedly lost sites.

I spoke to Colin recently and enquired if the swifts had used the boxes. He replied that they had not, but smiling, he added that swifts still managed to



nest in the roof as the birds had found unintentional gaps in the eaves!

I was asked by Clare Sanders recently to give a short talk to 'The Funsters', a group of youngsters who meet regularly at the rectory. I briefly explained about the joys of bird-watching and was amazed that these youngsters had turned up armed with binoculars and bird books.

Clare suggested that we went outside for a short walk to see what was about. I said that the chance of seeing anything of interest was nil. At that point a young girl asked what a bird was on the roof. It was a grey wagtail! Not a pied wagtail a grey wagtail on the rector's roof! Two minutes later we saw a male kestrel, and overhead we saw two skeins of geese - probably grey lag geese, totalling about 200 birds. And then, just a little further on, we put up a

> buzzard. So, after the children that we were going to see nothing, in 20 minutes we had had four sightings that any bird-watcher would want to view. Wrong again Reg!

Most days Reg Snook cycles to his studio in Grundisburgh from Ipswich. He is particularly well known for his wildlife paintings, and in recent years has also been painting large full length portraits of local people.

His next exhibition, entitled 'The changing face of Grundisburgh' will take place at Hill Farm, Grundisburgh Studio, from 5 to 20 December, between 10am and 4pm.

Reg says "It is over four years since I last painted village people. Sadly many have passed away, some have moved on and newcomers have arrived. There will be around 36 new portraits as well as bird paintings. Everyone is welcome to come and view".

#### Otley's Carbon footprint

At 18 tonnes per household Otley's carbon footprint is slightly better than the national average though much higher than the UN targets to stop runaway climate change

Just a quarter of Otley's households generate a massive 4.4 tonnes of CO2 by flying. This is one area where our choices have a big impact. A family of four

flying to Florida generate as much CO2 as the average Otley car emits over two years.

There is a good level of insulation in Otley's houses, although few meet the current recommended level of 10 inches in the loft. Heating and lighting our homes releases an average of 8 tonnes of CO2.

The rest of Otley's footprint comes from car use, mostly for shopping and commuting. We didn't measure other causes of CO2 such as manufacturing the things we buy

With energy costs set to rise the things we do to reduce our footprint also saves money

OtleyGreen surveyed 20% of Otley's households reflecting the mix in the village.
