Anti bypass campaign still going strong

The STOP! campaign, spearheaded by Hasketon residents Nick Green and Nick Deacon, is still gaining momentum in its attempt to reverse Suffolk County Council's proposals for a northern route to bypass Ipswich.

The consultation on the northern bypass proposals finished on 13 September. This was marked by the STOP! campaign's lively protest march which ended with a petition of 5000 signatures being handed in to Cllr Matthew Hicks, leader of SCC at Endeavour House in Ipswich. A copy was later handed to the Transport Minister Grant Shapps at the House of Commons on 31 October.

The results of the submissions to the consultation are still being analysed by the county council and were expected by the end of the year - but it seems the impending general election may delay this a little. The total of 4000 submissions was a massive response, compared to other consultations.

Generous donations to the campaign have been received from private

individuals, businesses and parish councils alike. Fund raising is still in progress to keep the campaign alive and to fund expensive legal costs required to challenge the legality of many aspects of the proposals.



STOP! CAMPAIGN SEEKS POSITIVE SOLUTIONS

The public consultation on proposals to build a bypass north of Ipswich has closed, having garnered an impressive 4,000 responses. The 500 people who attended the march through town to oppose the road have packed their placards and drums away. But the Stop! Campaign has certainly not stopped!

The petition against the road, which would devastate precious countryside and hasten climate change, continues to grow. The first 5,000 signatures were presented to Parliament by MP Dr Dan Poulter in October, but many thousand more are needed. If you have their permission, you can add your friends' and family's names to the online petition (even if they don't live locally) - why not send them an email today?

The Stop! Campaign has taken out full-page adverts in both the East Anglian Daily Times and the Ipswich Star making the case for alternatives to the road. Meanwhile Birketts Solicitors in Ipswich have agreed to represent the campaign in the legal fight against the bypass: there is an enormous amount to challenge.

Several events have been held, most recently a Grand Jumble Sale in Hasketon where a wonderful turnout helped to raise £1,800 in campaign funds. Regular drinks evenings are planned too: keep an eye on the website.

The next phase of the campaign aims to Start! Ipswich Moving by finding

Local Plan Enquiry

Philip Lewis, the inspector appointed to conduct the examination to determine whether the Local Plan is sound was due to publish his report in mid November.

The Inspectorate issued this statement on East Suffolk District Council website recently; "in order to avoid making announcements that could be politically sensitive, the Planning Inspectorate will not be issuing any letters

regarding the soundness or legal compliance of local plans, or final reports (including for fact check), until after the election. The fact check report is the version of the report the Planning Inspectorate sends to the Local Planning Authority to check for factual errors or inconsistencies."

The final report is issued after this process has been completed'.

Chapel Field

Many people in Grundisburgh are understandably very jumpy about what is going to happen about Chapel Field, the site allocated in the Final Draft Local Plan for 70+ dwellings. Whenever anyone is seen looking official walking around, digging it up or making notes, residents think 'that's it, they are getting ready to build'.

As far as Grundisburgh & Culpho Parish Council knows, nothing will or can happen until the Government

Inspector submits his report to the Local Planning Authority (East Suffolk). We will make sure that the relevant parts of the report are publicised via Google group, notice boards etc as soon as it is published.

SCHOOL REPORTS

Charsfield Primary School

As part of their Roman topic this term, Class 2 at Charsfield School visited Hands on Heritage, an activity-centre based in Tunstall Forest near Snape.

In small groups, they took part in several workshops, including weaving sheep's wool on looms to create Roman bracelets, making and cooking flatbreads on an open fire and smelting pewter to make their very own Roman amulets.

The highlight was being real-life archaeologists when they helped excavate a Roman villa by clearing away loose sand and earth to reveal Roman artefacts, ranging from pieces of pottery,



oyster shells, animal bones and roof tiles. The most exciting find was the mosaic floor and the painted fresco on the wall of the bath house.

Class 3 recently visited BT at Adastral Park where they spent a day programming robots called "Crumblebots". The children had to programme their Crumblebot to flash its light (twinkles) and move, as well as programming it to following a black line course

Once the children had mastered this, they competed against each other to choose the best two Crumblebots to represent their school. The two Crumblebots that won the Class 3 competition were: Tilly and Megan's, and Harry and Keir's. They then competed against the other schools in a race and I am delighted to report that Harry and Keir's Crumblebot won the overall competition!

It was a super day and the children learned a lot about programming and the work that BT does.

On Friday 6 December, Friends of Charsfield School are running a Christmas Fair with Secret Shop, raffle and all sorts of stalls. The event starts at 2.30pm and everyone is welcome!

SCHOOL REPORTS

Grundisburgh Primary School

Sue Marks, the new Head Teacher at Grundisburgh Primary, cares about children. This was clear when I went to see her, not long after her 'installation'. She delayed the interview because she was dealing with a child's welfare and, quite rightly, that took precedence over talking to me!

Coming from a large school in the private sector, I wondered how she would adapt to a state school in a village environment. She says the move has been made easy because of the genuinely warm welcome from staff and pupils alike and is impressed with the way the teachers really do care about their charges. Getting to know the children has been her first objective - helping them to become good citizens and safe in an environment increasingly driven by social media and on-line 'attractions'. She wants the school to develop more links with other groups in the village: a number of events have already taken place, with more to follow - so watch this space.

Sue has a scientific background and is a Fellow of the Primary Science Teaching Trust which aims to improve and support excellent teaching of primary science in every classroom in every school across the UK. The Trust is helping Sue set

up a 'nurture room' for 7 to 11 year old pupils to have a quiet space and to take the time just to observe, think and develop their intellectual curiosity. Friends of Grundisburgh School (FOGS) are helping to decorate the room - with a generous contribution from John Lewis - and adapt it to provide the setting for mindfulness and as an oasis of calm.

Sue's other plans include teaching French as a second language (including linking with a school in France); if the money was there, she would also like to to raise staffing levels and improve the fabric of the building.

Academisation was on the agenda last year but the school felt that the Trust's financials weren't robust enough and the matter was put on hold. If academisation does come to pass, Sue would insist that the school's core values of respect, kindness and putting children first are not undermined and that progress towards improving the school's overall performance continues.

The school held an open afternoon on 6 November when parents of prospective new pupils met the staff, saw children's work and toured the classrooms, guided by Year 6 pupils. Also on hand was Caterlink, which provides the school meals (including specific requirements, such as

vegan, kosher or halal). The company gives presentations on food and healthy eating to school assemblies - and even bakes bread every day on the school premises.

FOGS is an effective supporter of the school and welcomes anyone with (or without) children currently at the school to get involved. It is raising money (£1,277 so far this term - twice winning the village quiz has helped!) towards the 'Read, Learn, Nurture' campaign, aiming to 'buy a full set of 100 books to read' for each year group, as well as refurbishing the library and reading areas around the school.



Inside Christchurch Mansion

Paul Bruce, who lives in Culpho, has written a book on 'The Furniture of Christchurch Mansion, Ipswich from the 16th to the 19th century.

This describes three main periods of English furniture, broadly speaking under the three headings. Oak period embracing the furniture of the 16th and early 17th centuries, the Walnut period including the late 17th century and early 18th century and the Mahogany period beginning with the reign of George 11 1727-1760 through to George III 1760-1820. The book also focuses on the Victorian period up to 1892 when the Fonnereau family sold the house.

Co-incidentally the three periods of furniture ties in with the three families who lived in Christchurch Mansion. This book is an endeavour to illustrate the furniture and lifestyle of each period with over 60 photographs and illustrations.

NEW MANAGEMENT AT GRANGE FARM

Grange Farm Shop is one of the oldest farm shops in the area having been established in the 1950s to sell apples grown in Grange Farm's orchards. Fast forwarding some 65 years Grange Farm sees a bustling family-run business supplying the best of local fare, covering your needs from a family weekly shop to a pit-stop picnic, gifts and plants, not forgetting treats for pets.

Suffolk has a proliferation of high quality local producers and Grange Farm has long been at the heart of this. The shop has always moved with the times, catering to the changing needs of its much loved, loyal customers providing top quality local produce. The other key ingredient in the success of Grange Farm is that it has become a space for other businesses to flourish and mutually support each other.

At the outset when Mrs Tile and her farm manager Arthur Hubbard started selling apples, people bought in bulk, apples sold by the bushel (45lb/20kg). Now apples are sold by twos and threes.

Twenty years later, in the early 1970s, the apple farm and shop were taken on by my father Nicholas Longe.

Together with Arthur Hubbard, the shop expanded its range to include more veg, with apples now being sold in

10lb paper bags. Nicholas further expanded the range of food to include sausages, cold meat, milk, Christmas turkeys and Christmas trees.

In 1985 Penny King opened Kings Saddlery in the 230 vear old Black Barn and quickly established it as the leading saddlery in the area. And when Jenny Dow moved Clopton Flowers into the farmyard a few years later, a real base had been established. A base from which Richard and Alison Youngman, incidentally a cousin of Arthur Hubbard, grew the shop when they leased it in the late 90s. They added more delicious produce to the shop and had the inspiration to start the thriving hamper trade. Together with Ric Ackland Snow, who had taken on King's Saddlery, they opened the now very popular Barn Café.

Another important addition to Grange Farm has been Richard Rush Antiques. For many years Richard has run his furniture repair business in Hasketon and five years ago branched out with his partner Angela to open his popular shop, now twice featured on the BBC's Antiques Road Trip.

2019 has rung more changes, Richard and Alison have retired from the farm shop, leaving myself - the son of Nicholas Longe - and my wife Annabel to take on the reins of the shop and Grange Farm.

Kings Saddlery has sadly closed but in its place EJaRt Creative has sprung up providing a much needed space that is not only a show case for the wealth of local creativity but also a place where you can channel and develop your own creativity under expert tuition.

As for the farm shop, we are determined that it not only continues to serve our customers, offering the same levels of quality and value, but also that it doubles down on local excellence, for example selling organic produce grown in the Deben valley and gorgeous local milk from Guernsey and Jersey cows. At the root of our philosophy is sustainability, every new choice must be balanced so that it is a step towards a better future. A tough road but necessary.

All eyes are now on the Christmas period and following the successful tasting evening on 14 November, a special Christmas Evening is planned for Thursday 5 December with carol singers, roast chestnuts and Father Christmas, staying open until 9pm, with all the Grange Farm enterprises collaborating.

If you manage a visit to The Barn, you will see this wonderful space is now fully utilised and there is a long list of workshops in all sorts of






production and garden design.

Tfound an incredible range Lof crafts being worked on when I visited the group in Clopton Village Hall. The group began in January 2014 and is 12 strong. They hope to welcome new members, including men, who are keen to bring a craft to work on. A small fee of £2 includes coffee and helps towards the cost of hiring the hall.

Last Bank Holiday £960 was raised towards the upkeep of St Mary's Church, Clopton. Many local people helped and a wide variety of crafts were on display and a lot of local produce was sold. Two local musicians played the organ and the violin and helped to make it a successful and enjoyable community event.

Julie sat weaving a rug made out of sheep's wool in natural colours and she was using a peg loom. Quite a mesmerizing skill to watch as the wool was intrically woven around the pegs. To prepare the wool the fleece had to be washed, carded to get the tangles out, and then spun. A few years ago Julie took on the challenge of making a tailored jacket from the fleece of a Jacob cross.

Alix was creating a polar bear by needlefelt. She also does lino printing to make cards. Another interest is repairing and recycling vintage jewellery. If anyone has any pre 2000 jewellery which they wish to donate to the group this would be very much appreciated. Similarly, any blue or cream coloured cottons such as old shirts

at home often meant chores got in the way.

Rosemary Helen Mutimer (Bud) 1934-2019

Rosemary Helen (Bud) was born on an Army base in Scotland. Her father Hamilton

was in the Black Watch and Batman to Major General Gurdon. After both



medically discharged from the Army, Major General Gurdon suggested the Ferguson family move to Burgh House with the Gurdon family.

A happy childhood at Burgh House followed playing with the Gurdon children, games of tennis, swimming in Pratts Hole as well as helping themselves to Mrs Gurdon's Turkish cigarettes' and having a secret puff in the sandpit.

Bud and her older sister
Estella attended Grundisburgh
School, both getting told off
on their first day for having
"fancy joined-up
handwriting". The school had
a Young Farmers club which
Bud and her friend, Babs Last,
would not join. The club kept
two pigs which to their horror,
were duly named Bud and
Babs.

Following the arrival of brother Hammie, the family moved to a brand new house in Stoney Road.

After leaving school Bud worked in the accounts department at The Ancient House, Ipswich, and then in Grundisburgh Post Office. In later years Bud worked for the Antique Collectors Club undertaking the magazine subscriptions, continuing to work over retirement age.

Bud met Wally at a Grundisburgh Village Hall dance and they married in 1957, setting up home in Maltings Lane. Daughter Tracy was born and Wally secured land in Meeting Lane and began to build the bungalow. It was after Bud mixed 14 tons of cement that she discovered she was expecting Alison.

The move to the new bungalow took place in 1968. It was heaven as it had an indoor bathroom. Bud appreciated her new home and liked to keep it spic and span.

Sons-in-laws' were welcomed into the family and grandchildren began to arrive. Daniel, Adam, Amy, Jake and Livia all knew Bud as their Granma, spelt without a D as she was clear that she was a Granma, not a Grand-ma.

Family was everything to Bud, with the arrival of her first great granddaughter Florence she became Great Granma Bud and at Easter, we celebrated the birth of second great granddaughter Josephine Ella-Rose, the Rose in honour of Granma Bud. We all have so many treasured memories of Bud, a little lady who has left a big gap in all our lives.

The Mutimer family

Alison Dillon, 1928-2019

A lison Dillon (Lady Alison Janetta Drummond Dillon) who died in September aged 91 was by all accounts a moving force in Grundisburgh, described as 'a big presence' by Norman Davis, vicar of St Mary's in 2005.

She is remembered with

much



gratitude for her fundraising efforts, particularly in the 1980s when a huge campaign was needed to renovate or restore the

church building. Alison and her husband Brian took on the task with gusto, holding regular coffee mornings at their home, Bridge Farm House, plus events such as supper in 'the barn' - a beautiful and well appointed building, ideally suited to such gatherings.

A very independent lady she

not only had ideas but turned them into action, such as providing curtains for the vestry around the altar when she detected a draught coming from that direction - oh, and providing a new carpet for good measure! Similarly, she presented the choir with a set of new psalters when she became aware that the choristers were struggling with the demands of the psalm singing.

Alison's interests were not confined to church activities - she and Brian were very actively engaged in the setting up of the village Local History Society.

In September 1981, responding to an article in the Grundisburgh News asking if there was any interest in 15 people attended a meeting at Bridge Farm House. Brian who had been a high-court judge, put his legal expertise to formulating a constitution, and Grundisburgh Local History Society was born.

Alison and Brian moved to Woodbridge when Brian's health made it necessary but Alison long continued her association with Grundisburgh. The editorial she wrote for the first edition of the local history magazine explained 'It is not that we dislike the present; it is simply that the present seems to mean more if we have a knowledge of how our neighbourhood came to be the sort of place it is today'. It seems that she herself had no small impact on the sort of place we live in today.

Madge Nicholas

John Titshall (October 1928 – August 2019)

Cecil John Titshall was a quiet, contented man, but was always willing to stop and chat to people he met.

The only child of the family, John was born at the Grundisburgh Half Moon pub, which his parents ran. Later they moved to 'Laneside', aptly named, being on the junction of Meeting Lane and Half Moon Lane.

For a man who loved the countryside, the bungalow had a very country feel about it, surrounded by hedgerows

and plum trees, almost invisible from the road.

When
John was
nine he
contracted
polio,
which left
him with a
crippled
leg, and he
had to
wear a
caliper. This

didn't stop him though, and he played in goal for the village football team and went everywhere with the lads.

He would go on trips to Felixstowe, and speedway was one of his passions. His friend, Alan Lankester, used to take him about on the crossbar of his bike. Later on he loved going shooting and wood cutting with Alan.

John worked as a gardener for various people, including at Buttrum's Mill in Woodbridge. During WW2 he worked at Burgh Mill, but even there he wasn't safe from the dangers of war as one day American servicemen at Debach aerodrome decided to use the mill as target practice!

When he could no longer cope at home, he moved to Allonsfield House in Campsea Ashe, where he was well looked after and made a good friend in Jim. He was able to enjoy the birds on the feeders just outside his window, which he loved.

Speed matters

If a car travelling at 40 mph hits a pedestrian, there's a 90% chance that the pedestrian would be killed. At 30 mph, the chance is still 20%; at 20 mph, the chance is 2.5%. In response to growing concern about speeding in Grundisburgh, a number of volunteers have come together to form a Speedwatch group you may have seen them in hi-vis jackets with a radar 'gun' recording the speed and identity of vehicles.

In partnership with the Police, local councils and the community generally, the aims of Speedwatch are to raise drivers' awareness of the 30mph limit and to reduce speed in areas of concern. Since April, 264 vehicles have been logged at 35mph or over: the worst was 49 mph, with several at 47 mph. Details are regularly forwarded to the Police.

SID is also making his appearance at various sites around the village. SID is a Speed Indicating Device which is shared with other villages in the SAVID group and provides useful data on traffic flows: it has shown, for example, that 30% of vehicles entering Grundisburgh on the B1079 from Woodbridge exceed the 30mph limit.

Additionly, a portable vehicle-activated sign has been deployed - one survey on Rose Hill revealed that, in one hour, 31 vehicles were doing more than 30mph - two at 40 mph. Much of the traffic was heading towards the school.

The Speedwatch team would welcome more people who could spare just an hour, as and when they can, to join them: Geoff Caryer is the team's co-ordinator and he would be pleased to explain in more detaill what it's all about. He is on 01473 738108 or geoff@caryer.co.uk.
