# Northern Ipswich Bypass proposals scrapped

Excellent news for those opposing the Northern Ipswich Bypass – the 'STOP' campaign has finally triumphed. By highlighting the issue and actively encouraging people to engage with the consultation, they have succeeded in all proposals being quashed.

The results of the consultation and the Strategic Outline Business Case for the proposed Ipswich Northern Route were released on 27 January. They revealed that two-thirds of the 4286 respondents to the consultation were totally opposed to any of the proposed routes and only 26% were in favour of the project at all.

Suffolk County Council leader Matthew Hicks further announced that the county will not do any more work on the northern route proposal. He said the project could only continue if it had widespread support, but with three local councils and two of the county's MPs, Dr Dan Poulter and Dr Therese Coffey, opposing it, as well as the public response, he could not recommend any further work.

East Suffolk, Babergh and Mid

Suffolk Councils all came out against the proposals. But there has been a recognition that Ipswich is in urgent need of improvements to its traffic problems.

# CHAPEL FIELD CONCERNS

Grundisburgh residents, while relieved at the Northern Bypass proposals being scrapped, still have major concerns over plans for the development of at least 80 properties on Chapel Field at the junction of Chapel Road and Park Road. The petition opposing the development now has some 650 signatures.

The report from the government's planning inspector has yet to be received at the time of going to press. This will determine whether the site can be included in the Local Plan and whether development can take place at all.

The parish council argued very strongly that the site had been included without proper consultation and that the access roads made it entirely unsuitable and unsafe.

Though the Government want to prioritise house building the properties must be in the right place and comply with National Planning Policy.

# **Campaign to get Little Bealings pub back in business**

The Admirals Head in Little Bealings sadly closed in 2012. Concerned that the pub may be lost to the village and wider community for ever, Little Bealings Parish Council applied to register the Admirals Head as an 'Asset of Community Value' – an ACV.

Also at that time, a Save the Admirals Head group formed and. with the thought that Lord Nelson had been the Admiral the pub was named after, 'Lady Hamilton' began issuing invitations for locals to join her at social events, keeping the pub spirit alive. Then in May last year the owners of the Admiral's Head decided to put the pub on the market.

A public meeting at Bealings Village Hall in June was attended by more than 80 people, who were overwhelmingly supportive of the proposal to try and re-open the village pub; and so the 'Friends of the Admirals Head' was formed to launch a bid to purchase, re-open and run the Admirals Head for the benefit of the community. Many followed progress on the website at https://friendsofthadmiralshead.org.uk.

#### 'More than a pub'

The vision of The Friends of The Admirals Head is that a thriving, community-owned Admiral's Head would be 'more than a pub'. We want the pub to return to its invaluable place in the community, a place to meet, socialise and enjoy great food and drink.

The management committee has worked tirelessly, grappling with budgets, business plans, publicity, surveys, grant applications, setting up a community benefit society, and all that goes with getting any community business off the ground.

With the invaluable support of so many members of the community, individuals pledging over £87,000 to buy community shares, combined with loans and grant applications, Friends of the Admirals Head were able in November, to lodge a formal bid to buy the pub.

As things stand, the community bid has currently not been accepted by the owners but we continue with our efforts and hope that a buyer – whether private or the community bid – will be throwing open the doors in 2020! Thanks so much to all who have supported in any way.



When I met Andrew, he was about to set off to India for a four week stay at a yoga centre to further develop his technique in the country where yoga originated some 5,000 years ago and where today, Andrew says, more men than women take part.

He has been attending a renowned teacher's weekly class in London so he is well qualified to bring to Clopton all that he has learned and is still learning.

# An Eye in the Sky for Grundisburgh

Just about every film or TV drama has some drone footage, so much so that we take for granted those aerial shots.

However drones also have an extremely practical application, for example, aerial surveys for architectural purposes, crop management whereby farmers are far better able to detect areas deficient in nitrogen, land surveys, surveillance, inspections of pipelines, seeing into areas inaccessible by foot, roof inspections, photography and filming, search and rescue operations as used by emergency services, police forces (drones can also be fitted with infrared devices to search for missing persons, animals, etc) and a host of other applications.

Since the chaos last year at Gatwick airport caused by rogue drone operators, the Civil Aviation Authority has introduced a licensing system. All operators of drones now have to show an understanding of compliance with the rules and their ability to operate safely.

There are basic rules for drone operations such as, to fly no higher than 400' above ground

level, operate within a radius of 500 metres and within visual line of sight, not within 150 metres of a crowd of 1000 or more people, not closer than 50 metres to people, vessels, vehicles or structures not under the operators control.

So what drew me to drones? Before retirement I was an airline pilot up in the sky looking down on the ground, but now my feet are on the ground as I look up at the sky and it is for me a form of flying.

The drone I use is very sophisticated with a Hasselblad camera of 20 million pixels and a 3 axis stabilised 4k video up to 30fps, it can also track a moving object up to 40mph.

I have taken many photos of

The Stop! campaigners are continuing to work behind the scenes and its research team, headed up by Alan Walmsley, has now reviewed the 800 pages of the Strategic Outline Business Case and concluded that despite Cllr Hicks maintaining there is a strong economic business case, in fact it looks increasingly weak.

The county council will absorb the reactions from the district councils and local businesses and conclude its decision at a cabinet meeting due on 25 February. We are optimistic that this project does not have sufficient support to be taken any further

> but the 'Stop' campaign still has significant work to do to ensure that this issue is never brought forward again.

# New homes for our flying friends made in Hasketon

Up to 20 families were booked into four sessions for making bird and bat boxes at White House Farm Conservation project in late January. When I arrived some were already busy following a plan to make a box to take away. They were using a variety of tools including saws, chisels, set squares, hammers and nails and were wearing safety gloves.

An open barn provided a sheltered space to work in and a few metres away hot chocolate, tea or coffee could be taken in the cosy barn where a log fire burned.

In the trees to the side of the barn natural pine cone bird feeders hung and these were packed with vegetable suet.

Red Poll and British White Cattle help with conservation grazing. Goats and sheep may The next four volunteer conservation training sessions are being held on Sunday 29 March, 26 April, 31 May and 26 July, from 10am to 2pm. Participants are asked to take a packed lunch.

Also skilled volunteers are being sought to help with a variety of surveys on breeding birds, and butterflies including the Small Heath and the Silverwashed Fritillary. Also terrestrial invertebrates, fungi, mosses, and lichens using methodologies developed for the nature reserve.



# CHARLIE AND ROB TAKE UP A WINTER CHALLENGE FOR ALZHEIMERS

t 3am on 16 December ARob Attwater of Grundisburgh and former Clopton resident Charlie Linsell set off from Nottingham to walk to Woodbridge, This was to raise money for the Alzheimer's Society in memory of Charlie's grandfather who passed away two years ago. They both knew it was going to be one of the toughest things they had done but needed to find something to inspire people to support them.

Planning took some time but with the use of an app which



had maps of roads, footpaths, and bridleways a route was found which avoided main roads. Another friend, Harry Lamb, agreed to be their support car driver and met them at suitable locations with food and equipment. This was a great help as only a small rucksack had to be carried. Charlie has a background in sports and exercise sciences so was able to estimate the energy expenditure and how much food and water they needed.

From Nottingham their route took them through the north of Leicester, Peterborough, Ely, Bury St Edmunds, Stowmarket, Needham Market and Witnesham before finally arriving in Woodbridge on 18 December after 58 hours of walking.

The most challenging part was dealing with severe sleep deprivation coupled with navigating unknown roads on cold and dark December nights. Sore feet, aching legs

and cold hands brought discomfort and after 40 miles. Rob had a sharp pain searing through his left knee and doubted his ability to finish the walk. Fortunately, after resting for a while he was able to carry on.

They did have their fun

moments too. On one occasion they could not find the footpath and spotted a 5 foot high ridge of sand which they climbed only to find it led to a 60 foot drop! The map had not been updated and it had become a working quarry so a large

detour had to be made. Quotes from 'Lord of the Rings' kept them entertained during their darker more gruelling moments.

On the last morning just outside Ely Cathedral whilst having a five minute rest, Charlie was replying to one of the many motivational text messages and fell asleep.

Rob's grandmother Gill Twissell heroically joined them for the last seven miles and, despite their exhaustion and Rob's injured leg, she was almost running to keep up.

Over £2000 was raised for the Alzheimer's Society. They were in the top 3% of fundraisers for December out of 4000.

Both would like to thank everyone who donated and supported them in their adventure – not least of all friends who met them along the way with treats and Lemon Drizzle cake.

Entering a competitive exam, she won a job with the London County Council and went to work in the Architects



Department - where she met Geoffrey who also worked there.

They married in 1956 and lived in Hertfordshire. When Geoffrey became an area planning officer for Staffordshire County Council, they moved to the West Midlands. And the size of the family increased with the births of Mark and Elizabeth.

Always open to new ideas and interests, Dorothy studied the architecture of old buildings, and French and Italian, becoming fluent in both languages.

The Wheelers came to Grundisburgh in 1992 and 'rehabilitated' one of the six cottages in Half Moon Lane with Dorothy acting as 'builders mate' - and created a lovely home. Dorothy made many friends, joining book clubs, flower arranging clubs in the village and further afield. She became a 'holy duster' helping to keep the church clean and served on the parochial church council and the deanery synod.

She joined the Grundisburgh News team in the mid 1990s and acted as advertising manager, jointly with Joseph Awad, for several years. Dorothy died in hospital after a brief illness and is much missed by Geoffrey, and her family and friends.

# REPORT FROM THE WI

We began 2020 with a buffet and quiz night. Sally Butler was proud to be the first holder of our new centenary cup having gained 14 points throughout 2019 in our monthly competition.

Hot on her heels with 13 points each were Marion Minns and Carol Barker, closely followed by Barbara King with12 points. A very competitive year.

The Beehive home in Nakuru, Western Kenya, was formed by Jane and Alan Hutt (from Rendlesham) in 2014, to help young girls who have become pregnant as a result of being raped.

When she visited us in February Ruth Leigh told us about the remarkable work that this ordinary couple are doing. Many young girls some as young as 10 are repeatedly raped, and when they become pregnant many are thrown out of their community, shamed

and ill treated. The strict cultural rules call for the babies to be killed, as illegitimacy brings shame on the tribe.

Jane and Alan felt very strongly that they should do something to help these young women. Although they had no funds they decided to go ahead and rent a house in faith that their needs would be met. Miraculously, every month they received just enough donations to cover costs. They now have 22 young girls plus babies living with them as a family, giving them love, compassion and hope.

All the evidence of past decisions and the experience of residents today shows that the road network in the area cannot secure safe access and egress from the site for vehicles, pedestrians and cyclists. Access by emergency and service vehicles on the very narrow single track lanes is already problematic and the efficient delivery of goods difficult.

The extra 500 vehicle movements per day 80+ properties would bring would, we suggest, be a nightmare for our lovely village. Should the site remain in the Plan, the Parish Council will fight vigorously to oppose the scheme put forward by Hopkins Homes.
