

Local waterways: checking for pollution

You may remember the graphic renaming of Martlesham Creek in our local press which attracted a lot of publicity last year.



Not wholly undeserved because, while there is quite a lot of fecal pollution with E.coli bacteria in the tidal Deben, there is more in the non-tidal River Deben and in its tributaries, principally the rivers Lark and Fynn which flow through the News' area.

Local volunteers from many parishes have been sampling these waters for some months now, coordinated by the Deben Climate Centre (DCC) which is working in partnership with local parish councils and the University of Suffolk.

I decided to find out more and joined a sampling team at Great Bealings Boot Street bridge recently.

Our first samples were taken using a beaker on a long pole to reach into the centre of the River Lark's flow and decanting a small amount into sterile glass jars, labelling them with location, time and date.

We then walked upstream to take a sample from the outfall of the Anglian Water sewage treatment works and another a few metres downstream from the outfall pipe.

The samples were incubated by a volunteer in Great Bealings with the following E.coli results:
Boot Street Bridge: 62 colonies per ml;
Sewage Treatment Outfall: > 600 colonies per ml;
10 metres Downstream": 110 colonies per ml.

These results are quite alarming given that the Environment Agency's "safe

bathing limit" is 9 colonies per ml.

Other volunteers did tests in the Deben itself for phosphates (which in excess leads to high weed and algal growth) and ammonia (which can kill fish and other aquatic life).

The results showed that phosphate levels were also high: with the Natural England 'healthy river' set at levels well below these figures, there is clearly some work to be done by Anglian Water to bring these numbers down.

DCC volunteers met Anglian Water in December and heard that they have committed to put in place phosphate removal equipment at some of their sewage treatment works, including Charsfield. Work has already started at Debenham, and Anglian Water hopes to have all these removal facilities operational by the end of 2024.

The Deben Climate Centre has developed a network of over 40 volunteers who sample the river on a regular basis at up to 30 locations on the Deben and its tributaries, the River Fynn and Lark.

The Centre has a couple of mini-laboratory hubs where they test for E.coli bacteria, phosphates, ammonia and nitrates. These facilities are operated by volunteers with scientific research and testing expertise.

Findings are published and are shared with stakeholders such as Anglian Water, the Environment Agency and interest groups involved with the River Deben and its catchment, much of which is in The News' area.

Plans are in hand to deliver, starting this year, a programme of professional short courses and skills development. This will include nature-positive practices in farmed landscapes, introduction to biotic indicators of rivers and ponds, assessment and conservation management of hedgerows, carbon storage and nature-recovery measures in modified landscapes and the rewilding of small woods.

ESPA 2024

First off, a panel of experts (pictured right) in their fields took questions from the audience which gave rise to a spirited discussion. Journalist Michael Cole felt that local opinions are often ignored and objections not properly considered by the planning authorities; Lord Deben



argued for taxation on housebuilders to reduce incentives to build where there was no demonstrable need. That got the meeting off to a good start!

New legislation foreshadows a major shift in the way planning decisions are reached. It has been claimed that there will be better 'community engagement' (i.e. residents' voices will be

listened to and, hopefully, taken on board by the planning authorities to find mutually agreed solutions). The East Suffolk Planning Alliance meeting, attended by about 70 parish and district councillors and other representatives many from communities in the News' area, voiced serious concerns that the whole planning process was asymmetric, with the professionals having far greater knowledge of the new laws (many of which have not been introduced yet) than that possessed by lay people, such as parish councillors and 'the man in the street'.

This puts the latter at a

considerable disadvantage when it came to commenting on - or objecting to - planning proposals in their town or village.

One suggestion from the floor was that ESPA should create a fund to acquire the professional knowledge and expertise and make it available to members so that they would be better informed on the lawand how they could then deal with planners on a level playing-field basis.

This might also enable residents to prepare better arguments against a particular development in terms that the planners would understand and accept, possibly negating some of the negative experiences of the past.

Lord Deben said that in Debenham the new Neighbourhood Plan is working because there had been a sensible dialogue with the planners. One delegate argued that it was for planners to do planning, not house developers, but that it was incumbent on us all to see the development that we want to see and that a top-down approach was not helpful.

Other issues raised included the question of flooding and the complex requirement to have biodiversity net gain with certain newly approved

developments (as from last week).

This is a very new piece of legislation and we will need time to see how it will operate in practice. Overall there seemed to be general agreement that councillors and local politicians should listen more than they do and to speak to ESC about their concerns. And similarly, Chris Bally (Chief Executive Officer, ESC) said, "developers should speak to villages" about their plans, citing also the ESC town and parish council forums as



ways of communicating up and down. Although there is already a Local Plan Working Group, there was some support for a joint ESPA/ESC working/study group.

Next steps: there was no time to draft a communique after the meeting but the ESPA steering group will now be drawing all the components of the discussion together and report back to members in the next few days.

In the near future modern replacement chairs will be provided thanks to a donation from an organisation in Woodbridge that no longer needs them. We also hope to replace some of the older wooden tables with folding aluminium ones matching the others in the room.

The major rebuilding works to the roof and first floor are also nearly complete, so the scaffolding should be coming down soon.

These works have been quite extensive involving the replacement of a large amount of the building infrastructure, replacing and updating wood and brick components with the addition of steel reenforcement, thus extending the life of the building for many decades.

Tribute

4 July 1931 – 30 October 2023 Walter Eric Mutimer

Wally was born in the village of Hemingstone, the youngest of seven children. He attended Gosbeck Primary and Witnesham Schools.

He was a mischievous boy, often involved in practical jokes and although war time brought sadness for Wally it



was also exciting - watching the planes flying overhead, racing to crash sites to collect mementoes and making his own explosives. Aged 12 Wally joined the Army Cadets and at 16 he joined the Ipswich Squadron Air Training Corps. He was soon promoted to Corporal and then Sergeant. While in the ATC Wally obtained his glider pilot licence and took part in a march at Buckingham Palace for the first changing of the guard after the war.

Leaving school, Wally started an apprenticeship as a carpenter for Bannisters at Coddenham: he was granted time off work to play football for Suffolk Under 15's and also played for Coddenham Men's team. Later he played for Westerfield FC and was a lifelong supporter of Ipswich Town.

In 1951 he joined the RAF to do his National Service. He attended technical school at RAF Henlow and was then stationed at RAF Honington as a Leading Aircraft Engineer.

After leaving the RAF, Wally served in the Royal Observer Corps at Burgh Mill. He returned to the building trade working for A J Gibbons of Crowfield, becoming General Foreman before moving to Ingram Smith as Contracts Manager.

Wally attended local dances and it was at Grundisburgh old village hall he met Bud. They married in 1957 at Grundisburgh Church and set up home at 1 Malting Lane. It was always Wally's intention to build his own home and, following the purchase of land in Meeting Lane, Wally built the bungalow during his evenings and weekends over the next four years.

He took part in many village organisations: he was a founder member of Friends of Grundisburgh School and as Chairman he helped concrete the base for the school swimming pool, helped set out and worked on the sports pavilion and various maintenance jobs on the church including repainting the church clock face. For 40 years Wally climbed through the church bells to put the flag up, a job he reluctantly gave up aged 82.

Wally enjoyed many hobbies: he played for Grundisburgh Bowls Club, becoming Captain and also played league table tennis. He originally flew model planes on a static line before moving to radio control. He built his own models, took part in flying demonstrations and taught people to fly. He ran an indoor flying club and volunteered at Martlesham Control Tower.

On his 90th birthday the family took Wally to Duxford, where he flew in a Spitfire, taking the controls and even doing a barrel roll!

This was all clearly and convincingly explained when Dr. Emily Nightingale, the newly installed vet in Ashbocking, gave a half-hour talk on the subject to a fascinated audience (plus 10 beautifully behaved dogs) at The Moon and Mushroom in Swilland recently.

Little Bealings Community Hub and Café wins award

Mullins Dowse Architects ends year with prestigious Quality of Place Award from East Suffolk District Council: on 29 November, 2023, the Little Bealings Church Community Hub won the prestigious design award from among 12 finalists. The awards recognise the best in design and conservation in East Suffolk and the Hub project was one of many conservation projects that Mullins Dowse Architects has undertaken since its inception over 50 years ago.

The Bealings Community Hub and Café at All Saints Church received the award which is "for any built or natural environment project designed to benefit the community in which it was built". Judges looked at community engagement with the project and the public benefits of the scheme and were particularly impressed by

the enthusiasm and passion of the many volunteers who helped to steer the project for the past 7 years through myriad consultations and reviews.

Their efforts culminated in sensitive and welcome upgrades to the fabric of the Church by Stowe Builders and the installation of a handcrafted kitchen by

Heritage Coast Cabinet Makers, designed to fit quietly within the confines of the one-room 700-year old listed building.

As local district councillor Colin Hedgley said, "I am very pleased that the Little Bealings Hub won this award. A great deal of hard work went into making it a success and it is good news that the East Suffolk Awards Committee recognised the benefit to the community."

According to Elizabeth Sinha,
Director and Architect, "I submitted
this project for consideration not only
because of the quality of the work that
was undertaken, but also because it
was a labour of love for me. I grew up
in the village, sang in the Church
choir and have returned to raise my
family here.

"Preserving and improving listed buildings - especially churches - takes particular care and attention to detail. Conservation is something that excites me and this type of project inspires us to be creative in developing appropriate solutions, both for the building and for the community. As a member of the community today, it is wonderful to see how my children and I can come and enjoy all the activities both in the church and outside too, and we love the homemade treats served at the Absolutely Divine Cafe."

Before the project, the church was used for only one or two hours a month by a small group of parishioners and there was no local shop, pub, or post office nearby. Thanks to the vision of Reverend Celia Cook and the expertise and energy of a dedicated group of volunteers - along with the inspiration and project leadership of Mullins Dowse Architects - the Church was able to raise about £200,000 to make much needed repairs and upgrades – to the heating, the plumbing, the flooring, the fire safety system, and, of course, installing a full range kitchen to open the café to the public.

Now, the Church is on the path to a stronger financial footing and as local minister Reverend Gary Jones said, "As a Church community we are pleased with this award which recognises all



the hard work that has been put in by everybody for this wonderful facility for the whole community to be able to use."

In addition to the talent and energy of the volunteer team and advisors, generous donations from a wide range of local and national funders, and encouragement by local residents, the support and approval of the diocese was crucial to the creation,

approval, and implementation of the project.

As Archdeacon Rich recently commented, "Historically, parish churches have been at the heart of village life and the reordering of All Saints Little Bealings has been imaginatively and sympathetically carried out, creating a warm inviting space for a wide range of worship and community activities."

Several new regular activities and events have taken place - including flower festivals, tavern evenings, Bealings Borrowers - an after-school eco group, Suffolk Constabulary meetings, Alpha Bible discussion groups, jazz and WI concerts and performances, pilates classes, local

choir practices, the Suffolk Cinema Club, even dog sniffing workshops - and the Café has drawn wide praise for its incredible menus and very tasty coffee! Services are also enhanced by the new heating system and the after-worship coffees are first rate!

Of course, there has been a lot of learning along the way and we are happy to share the lessons of both our success and challenges in order to help other churches or community assets who may be seeking to expand their mission and open their doors wider.

Views wanted on getting around in Woodbridge

Public views are being sought on active travel schemes in Woodbridge - the town visited by many residents in the News' catchment area. The consultation has been launched on proposals designed to make it easier to choose more active ways of getting around the town. Suffolk County Council has secured more than £5million of funding to make Woodbridge's streets safer, betterconnected and more people-friendly.

The council spoke to more than 500 people at a series of public engagement events last summer and autumn about their existing travel behaviours and suggestions for possible enhancements to active travel infrastructure in the area.

This feedback, along with analysis of local traffic data, has been used to help develop a set of proposals that cover various locations within the town which will enable people to walk, wheel and cycle and promote cleaner travel options. These include footpath improvements, shared-use paths, modal filters, and a 20mph zone. The online consultation closes on 9 April.

Moving on to 2024! We have a busy term ahead and here are just a few of the things that we've been getting up to so far.

Our youngest pupils in Rowan class have been learning about London as part of their topic Bright Lights, Big City. Over the course of the term, the children will learn what a city

is, they will find out about some of landmarks and learn about the Great Fire of London.

In science the children are learning all about the seasons and the weather. Our writing is linked to the book All Aboard the London Bus. In our DT lessons we will be learning about moving vehicles and the London taxi!

In our KS2 classes pupils are learning about what the earth is made of and the natural disasters that occur in our Geography topic: Rocks, Relics and Rumbles. We have been finding out how fossils and different rock types are made, and we have been using these to inspire our artwork.

We are designing motifs to create a repeating pattern and later in the term we will be creating sculptures from clay. In science lessons the children are exploring states of matter and finding out more about these through exciting experiments.



In our literacy lessons, pupils in Oak Class (Year 4, 5 and 6) are using the story of Charlie and the Chocolate Factory to inspire their writing. We have invented our own sweets and written invitations (in the form of a Golden ticket) to Charlie

Bucket inviting him to Wonka's amazing Chocolate Factory. Pupils in Ash Class (Year 2 and 3) have been using the book 'The Marvellous Fluffy Squishy Itty Bitty' to inspire their story writing.

This term we have resumed our Forest School sessions where the children explore, create and learn in our forest school area on site. The activities vary weekly, but the children have great fun. Activities can involve anything from: making stretchers, dens, bug hotels to building campfires to pond dipping or bug hunting. Beating the scammers

Some 40 Grundisburgh residents attended a presentation on 20 November in the village hall on how to keep themselves safe online. The event was organised by resident Paul Finch, who had recognised that after local engagement with people struggling with IT issues, a lack of familiarity with computers and smartphones would leave them particularly vulnerable to online threats

The topics were presented by Paul, Will Barber and James Mott, and covered how to be a Human Firewall, how to recognise where threats might be coming from, and how to spot email scams such as phishing, and what to do if you have been the





victim of a scam Feedback from the participants was overwhelmingly positive, with such comments as, "Reinforced what I'd been told before and made me realize I

need to always be vigilant. "Made me think about new aspects of safety" and "Really useful informative and wonderful event for the community".

At the event many people mentioned that further sessions would definitely be needed to build on the information presented. So a team comprising Paul, Will, James, Phil Bailey and Lynette Chapman have started up a new social enterprise called Community Tech Hub, which will aim to develop further workshops, online materials, support activities and individual/ group training sessions.




Sounds better!

Audiences in Grundisburgh Village Hall have been impressed by its comfort and technical resources, but not by its acoustics.

A specialist survey revealed significant echoes which are causing noticeable difficulties in hearing and understanding speech when watching films, or addressing an audience via the hall's seven hifi loudspeakers.

The blue line in the graph below shows the echoes in the vocal range which are leading to distortion and lack of clarity.



The green line is the target to aim for improvement in the acoustics; any reduction in the RT (Reveberation Time, or echo) will make it much easier to hear and understand speech in the films and presentations when using the hall's excellent audiovisual gear. The ceiling mounted projector is capable of showing high definition BluRay films and we will all benfit from any improvement in the acoustics.

The Village Hall trustees have accepted gratefully the Parish Council's offer of funding towards additional acoustic panels, and the aim is to install these in the near future. I'm happy to supply the original, detailed acoustical report to anyone interested.


