With the plants and trees now sporting their summertime colours, it is time for Hidden Gardens to become Open Gardens in Grundisburgh. This popular event is happening on Saturday 7 and Sunday 8 June from 2.00 pm until 6.00 pm.

Tickets, together with a map showing all the participating gardens, will be available on the Grundisburgh Village Green, or the car park at IP13 6PU. As usual, there will be tea and cakes available, and plants for sale.



The Grundisburgh Village Show will be held on Saturday 12 July from 12.30 pm to 5.00 pm, on the Grundisburgh playing field.

The Show Programmes have been printed and are available in numerous outlets, including Suffolk Deli, Old Forge Stores, Frankie's and the doctors' surgery. These programmes contain full details of all the classes in which you can enter your produce, baking, floral arrangements, photographs and other categories. Last year we had over 800 individual entries across the various classes. The entry form is in the programme with details of where and when to submit them

In addition to the entries submitted for judging, there will also be a host of attractions for families on the playing field. Everything from bouncy castles to vintage cars, with refreshments including a BBQ, ice cream van, tea and cake stalls and the licensed bar in the pavilion.

Entry to the field is free (entry to the marquee is 50 p) and parking is available on the field.

### **Little City**



## **New Team at New Street**

Over the years, many readers will have popped into the New Street Market on New Street in Woodbridge (opposite Ye Olde Bell & Steelyard pub), which has offered all kinds of intriguing goods and attractions in the past.

The site closed down for a few weeks recently as the owner decided to do other things and has let the place to Grundisburgh resident Tim Wilson and his business partner Sam Walker.



I met Tim in March, prior to the re-opening of the facility while his team were busy painting walls and building counters and work spaces to find out what he and Sam have in mind. Since then, the heavily revamped building has opened to the public and has a hugely varied array of events and activities already lined up.

I began by asking Tim how he came to be living in Grundisburgh and working in Woodbridge, given that he is the son of an American Dad and an Australian Mum and he was brought up in London.

While Tim was at university in London, he met David Wright whose family ran the Cake Shop Bakery in Woodbridge, which started in Grundisburgh, perhaps Tim's first real contact with this area. After university, and being something of a serial entrepreneur, Tim and David created the Heritage Arts Company which specialised in

producing theatrical events and material using a wide range of collaborators including writers and comedians. In 2007, Tim and David Wright presented a show at Landguard Fort in Felixstowe called "Where Soldiers Sleep". Performers presented immersive re-telling of myths relating to the surrounding coast to audiences in the fort.

They later moved into organising the VAULT Festival

under Waterloo
Station. To quote
an article from The
Guardian, "Vault
festival, which
gave artists a
favourable box
office split,
provided a
platform for
fledgling
companies to put
on short runs of

show, which often bloomed into hits at the Edinburgh fringe".

Another of Tim's 'under the arches' projects was 'One Night Records', which again used railway arches as multiple venues for musicians of different genres. My family and I actually went there a few years ago and wandered from tunnel to tunnel listening to performances varying from blues bands to duelling pianos. Sadly this closed in 2023.

In 2019, Tim and his wife Annie had their second child and moved to Suffolk. Annie is a psychotherapist and operates from their Grundisburgh home under the name Annie Broadbent. Tim was elected as a district councillor for Rendlesham & Orford a couple of years ago and now has a role promoting economic development and infrastructure projects.



His varied and colourful business history means that he was ideally placed to create a new vision for New Street Market and to turn it into a reality, alongside Sam and the rest of their team. So what is that vision?

The site in New Street is a deceptively large building as the relatively narrow frontage disguises the fact that the building goes back a very long way. This allows it to have multiple uses in different sections of the space.

First up is a café which is open seven days a week, staying open until 5 pm Monday to Wednesday and until 11.00 pm Thursday to Saturday (3 pm on Sundays). Opening at 9 am, they expect to have a lively breakfast and brunch trade.

Additionally, there is a shop. This will specialise in intriguing homeware products from countries around the world including Morocco, Mexico and Japan. The works of local artisans will also be on sale, producing ideas for gifts and home use. The intention is also to sell vintage and antique pieces as well.

Other spaces will be dedicated to a 'wine cave' and a food pantry.

At the back of the building is

what Tim calls "The Square". This is a space in which creative people can come to produce works and demonstrate their skills in an open forum.

As can be seen, this is intended to be a hub for the community and in addition to the permanent features, there is an event space. The website (newstreetmarket.com) is already displaying a range of events from Spanish lessons, to pilates classes and musical performances. Check it out to see if there's something you might wish to attend.

Tim has other ideas for the future such as hosting podcast broadcasters but it seems that he, Sam, Annie and the team have plenty to be getting on with for the time being, given that it only opened at the end of March.

In addition to the website quoted above, there are already plenty of interesting photographs on Instagram under the tag newstreetmarketwoodbridge.

Many people lamented the closure of the site, so it is very exciting to see the place coming back to life with such an interesting and diverse vision.

# Grundisburgh Village Hall is alive with the sound of music - and it raises money for local charities

They say that singing is good for you:

- Singing strengthens the immune system
- Singing improves your posture
- Singing helps with sleep
- Singing is a natural antidepressant
- Singing lowers stress levels
- Singing improves mental alertness
- Singing can widen your circle of friends
- Singing boosts your confidence

It most certainly has attracted a large number of our local residents. Grundisburgh has had the benefit of a ladies choir, Upbeat!, for 12 years.

More recently a men's

chorus, Offbeat!, has been added which complements the ladies and widens the range of sell out concerts that the choir presents twice a year.

The choir has some 80 ladies, with a waiting list for new members and some 23 men. There is no waiting list for the men who are looking to swell their numbers.

The men and ladies of the choir (are of all ages) are attracted from local residents as well as people from further afield in the surrounding villages. They meet weekly in the wonderful Grundisburgh Village Hall, where the twice yearly concerts are also held.

They are of all ages. Can they sing? Not necessarily to start with, though being able to hold a tune helps. Certainly few can read music, though they do use music for the songs they sing.

One member said: "We have an amazing, and very tolerant, choir master, Carol, who manages to elicit the best from us."

What sort of music? Mainly popular music rather than classical, though not pop music as such. Our contact says: "We recently



had a concert of music from the musicals.

This included some of Andrew Lloyd Webber's musicals and we were delighted to get a good luck message from him personally just before the concerts. He wasn't able to come though as we were sold out."

The men's choir meet on Tuesday evenings at 7:30 at the Grundisburgh Village Hall, whilst the ladies meet on Thursday evenings, also at 7:30.

They focus on the music for two concerts, one in the summer and one a few weeks before Christmas. Each concert is for two or three performances and they are usually sold out.

Whilst the money raised from the concerts helps to cover the costs of hall hire and music, etc, a portion of the modest entry price is given as a donation to small local charities. Since the original choir was formed they have raised over £30,000 for local charities. Contact:

# Planning Issues: latest update from ESPA



Planning rules, housing targets, various guidelines and local government reorganisation are all on the horizon and these will affect us all in one way or another and residents and parish councils will need to ensure their say is not just heard, but taken account of by the 'authorities' where planning and environmental issues are concerned.

That was very much the message I took away from the latest meeting of ESPA, the organisation of, largely, parish and town councils in East Suffolk that has sprung up from concerns that planning decisions are being made in a less than transparent manner. (This article represents my own views and has not been seen by ESPA!)

ESPA has entered into a positive dialogue with East Suffolk planners which, it's hoped, will improve relations between parishioners and those who make planning decisions. The meeting included a

mini-tutorial from three people who have some experience in dealing with complex planning issues.

### First up

Michael Reynolds spoke about the Westerfield quarry application (see also p 14). The plan is to extract some 1.7 million tonnes of sand and gravel from the site.

He said that the application appears not to comply with the National Planning Policy Framework (NPPF) and that the applicants had produced some rather unclear statistics about HGV traffic flows and disregarded factors like noise and air pollution.

Further work needs to be done by the residents to ensure that open farmland is protected against development.

### Next

Richard Ward spoke about the proposal to build houses in Tuddenham, the planning application for which has been on the cards for many months but has suffered from delays outside the parishioners' control.

The conversation in the

room turned to the conduct of site visits by planners, where it was felt that residents did not get the chance to have their say on the ground.

ESPA will look at the whole issue of site visits and come back to affiliates with some firm advice based on their research.

This is very much ESPA's raison d'etre and we can look forward to some positive input to help parishes understand the rules and how to work effectively within them.

### **Finally**

Barbara Robinson took the floor with her slot on retrospective applications (often as a result of enforcement by planners), prompted by the plans for development by Wilderness Reserve at Huntingfield.

Barbara also spoke on the vexed issue of the national information requirements for planning applications, often referred to as the 'National List'. It includes basic essentials for all planning applications such as specific plans and drawings, and specific requirements based upon application types.

In addition to the 'National

List', the Local Planning Authority can adopt a 'Local List', in accordance with the NPPF and all planning and planning related applications submitted to ESC must comply with the requirements of this local List.

Any applications submitted without all the necessary information for the application type/proposal will not be validated.

A brief Q&A session followed and included a plea from Rupert Herries for more responses from affiliates as to how, for example, ESPA should conduct its dealings with ESC; what topics most concern parishes and residents; and what info is needed from ESPA

It could be a case of "we don't know what we don't know" but Rupert's message was - give ESPA a try. In brief: more input, please!

Finally, a personal offer from one affiliate, Julia Ewart, East Suffolk Councillor for Kelsale and Yoxford: "call me on 07823 if you think I can help - I do have some experience in these matters!"

## Cyber attacks: Suffolk village start-up leads the way for individual protection



Brainchild of Grundisburgh resident Paul Finch, the Community Tech Hub has just celebrated its first full year as a Community Interest Company, providing valued IT knowledge, reassurance and protection to people in and around Grundisburgh.

Those not familiar with the Tech Hub may be thinking 'what does it do?'. Paul told me that it enables people to get to know how to use their devices for what they want them to do. In some cases, it is relatively simple things like

helping people how to store information in a cloud or showing how to connect a phone to a car.

At the other end of the scale, the Hub team has helped sort out hacked email accounts and also advises people how to spot and avoid scams and cyber crime.

In the last 12 months, they have had 35 call outs to resolve issues like this and are becoming like the RAC of local technology users.

Since November, they have been holding 'drop in' sessions in the Deli in Grundisburgh on Monday mornings.

Additionally, in the last year, the Hub has held 7 workshop or training sessions on different subjects, with more in the calendar for later this year. They have also written a new program to log and manage all the entries and prizes for the Grundisburgh Village Show. (Thanks again guys).

The Hub is financed by a number of subscribers, as well as having received grant funding from Grundisburgh's Parish Council and Horticultural Society, and East Suffolk Council.

Future plans include a greater focus on helping parents to ensure their children's online safety, very much a hot topic at the moment. Also, a roll out of a similar hub in Ipswich, with its own team of volunteers.

A date for your diary is Sunday 16 November when the Hub is holding a Scam Awareness Day, a free event at which cyber security experts and Suffolk Police will be in attendance to share their knowledge and advice on keeping safe online.

A special alarm unit is installed in the home and a small push button pendant is provided which may be worn as a necklace or wrist band. On pressing the button, the alarm unit automatically transmits a signal through the telephone line to a response centre where an experienced operator will instantly know who is calling where they are, together with other medical and personal contact details.

The alarm unit contains a microphone and loudspeaker enabling two way communication. Even if a person is too far away from the unit to hear, or unable to speak, there is no need to worry, help will be summoned.

### **Tribute**

### Roy Arthur Girling 20 April 1943 - 7 March 2025



Roy was born in Ipswich and lived his early years at Waltham Cottages, Little Stonham on the A140. An only child, he started school at Stonham before the family moved to Stutton and Lower Holbrook, then on to Ashbocking where he attended Witnesham School where he always said he largely learnt to look after pigs, although being dinner monitor guaranteed extra pudding.

On leaving school at 14 he worked for Peter Wright on his farm in Ashbocking. Whilst at Vicon he recalled trying to cycle the ten miles home from a Christmas function with a vegetable box and a chicken he'd won in the

function with a vegetable box and a chicken he'd won in the raffle on his handlebars - all with some difficulty after an afternoon with a free bar. Ransome Sims and Jeffries came next and while he was there he met Gill at a funeral in Charsfield Church.

In 1972 they married at Freston Church; housing they could afford was scarce, and Roy proudly said there were 26 estate agents in Ipswich and he visited them all every week until he found them a house which needed a lot of work. He treated the dry rot and installed a gas central heating system although Gill recalls taking Claire and I out when the boiler was connected as she was convinced it would blow up.

In 1974 Keith was born, then Claire in 1977. In the lead up to the Orwell Bridge being built, 40 lorries a day were going past the door in Felixstowe Road so Roy and Gill looked elsewhere. They found a bungalow in Grundisburgh, once again needing a lot of work, and the family moved in on 1st December 1981.

Roy joined the Grundisburgh bowls club having previously played at John Player. He was chairman of the club for a while and ran some fund raising events and he regularly helped prepare the food for outside fundraising competitions.

He had a keen eye for antiques and a bargain. When he went to the tip with rubbish from his work in the house he always came back with something that just needed a bit of work.

I can recall many times being sent over the side of a skip to retrieve something in the days before the dump was manned.

After retirement he was a regular at Campsea Ash saleyard on a Monday and hired shop space in Framlingham to sell his treasures. He also loved to fish and, with Keith, belonged to various angling clubs.

When Gill retired in October 2005, Roy too decided he had had enough of work and handed in his notice, hand written on a scrap of paper. By now he was working for GAH in Melton and there too he made good friends. It was not until the day arrived for him to leave anyone took him seriously. They both retired on 27th October 2005: the day before their 33rd wedding anniversary.

He was a great reader and would buy books at charity shops and store them, once read, in the garage. In September, when the church fete took place on the village green, he could be seen loading them into his wheelbarrow and pushing them down the road to donate to the book stall.

Roy was diagnosed with Parkinsons in 2016. For some while he would take himself off to weekly private gym sessions to try to stave off the effects of the disease. His trainer, Tyrone, was exmilitary and more used to putting soldiers through their paces. We understand that there was regular verbal sparring between the two as Tyrone attempted to put Roy through his paces.

A loving husband, father and grandfather, he never lost his sense of fun. Many have written in the numerous sympathy cards received by Gill of his wit and sense of humour.

## **Proposed quarry at Westerfield**

## **Stop the Quarry** "spread the word".

The first of two public meetings held by the Stop The Quarry campaign was attended by over 130 people on Monday 31st March at Witnesham Village Hall.

The campaign group gave their reaction to Tru7's Open Day, outlined the work of their research group and explained how the public can object. The recurring message of the meeting was for everyone to "go out and spread the word". It will be a hard fight, but with the public support, one that can be won.

Should the 16 year project go ahead there will be major implications for traffic on the B1077 and the north of Ipswich. Contrary to what many people have assumed, the sand and gravel is not intended for Sizewell, but will be transported along the B1077 to Tru7's aggregate plant at Sinks Pit in Kesgrave.

This means 400 - 500 lorry movements a week, all turning left on to the B1077, making their way across Westerfield level crossing, then left at the roundabout onto Colchester Road and finally the A1214 to Kesgrave. This, in addition to existing traffic.

Traffic disruption due a closed level crossing in Westerfield will become much worse as freight travelling to Sizewell increases and the Ely Junction Capacity Project brings more containers travelling by rail to Felixstowe. There is no clarity in Tru7's plan about how lorry movements will be enforced or controlled when the road/level crossing is closed.

The campaign group reiterated the fact that the site for the quarry is in a completely inappropriate location. They referred to the County Council's own current Waste Plan which had identified 20 potential sites in Suffolk. Ten of these sites had been rejected as they were poorly located. None of the 9 sites licensed are at full capacity.

By the time The News is published a referendum on Westerfield's Neighbourhood Plan will have been held. The plan refers to Westerfield being "maintained as a small village" and the need to "protect the landscape and rural feel". This includes Westerfield Hall farm which is a Grade II\* listed Heritage Asset. If the Neighbourhood Plan is approved it becomes a statutory part of local planning. The whole project, the group maintains, is "not a public need, but a private want".

At the time of going to press no Planning Application has been formally submitted and it may still be some weeks away.

Once it has, villagers and the wider public, are being urged to submit their objections in writing. Each objection needs to be individually written and signed to count. Letters need to be factually based and refer directly to the planning application and not to the effect the quarry might have on house prices.

Anyone who objected to Tru7's original scoping request, will need to object again. Community will has to be taken into account so the more objections the better. The public can also attend the Planning Committee meeting and write to their MP.

The campaign group is still appealing for volunteers and especially those with expertise in environmental science and planning law. It is asking everyone to "spread the word" to friends, neighbours and others who will be affected

## When is a quarry not a quarry?

I have often wondered what goes on at Sinks Pit and was delighted to be able to visit in March and see for myself what goes on just a few miles down the road from our village.

Ben Wale and I ventured over at the invitation of the senior leadership given our interest in gardening, the environment and biodiversity. We had heard rumours of woodlands and bee hives hiding behind the workshop and learned so much about what Tru7 Group are doing.

The first thing we learned is that the site hasn't been used



as a quarry for very many years, long before the current owners took over. Now, it is used mainly to recycle products to sell to local builders and for hire of equipment that companies need to build houses and other structures in the area

There's also a giant machine used to supply cement mixers and a crusher for breaking down stones which are then screened using mainly recycled water. The materials are then separated so they can be bought locally rather than being trucked into the area from further afield.

## **Sinks Pit**

Ben and I were particularly interested in the work that is being done to enhance biodiversity, some of which is included in recent government regulations for businesses like Tru7 Group, such as making all cement production and every litre of diesel bought fully carbon offset, but other elements are just good things to help keep our earth in better shape which the company has voluntarily implemented.

Two examples are the woodland area and the bee hives. The woodland area-which is just to the left as you



enter the site--has been created with the assistance of a local ecologist.

Mud piles and bat boxes are in the works to attract more wildlife to the area. Suffolk Wildlife Trust will be consulted to ensure that the area is properly maintained and optimised to attract all sorts of creatures. In addition to the woodland, Tru7 Group owns lots of nonindustrial land around their HQ in Kesgrave, and in one area they are creating their very



own Bee Colony! They currently have 4 beehives by unused silt ponds which are surrounded by a wildflower meadow.

The company hopes to link up with others to help create the Bee Superhighway which is already underway in Rushmere and other surrounding villages.

Bee Expert, Steve Barrett is overseeing the hives and perhaps one day there will be locally made honey sold in farm shops nearby!
