SLOW DOWN -STRATEGY AHEAD

The local group SAVID ("Safer Village Driving") is being revitalised. Representatives from a number of villages banded some years ago together to respond to the issue of speeding. Recently the group had struggled to maintain momentum and achieve its aim of villages working cooperatively to encourage safer driving and the observance of speed limits.

New representatives have now joined the group, with a fresh commitment to updating the strategy.

In 2016, 1,792 people were killed on the roads in Great Britain, with a third of these in crashes on rural roads.

Nationally, 15% of fatalities were in crashes where at least one driver was thought to be exceeding the speed limit. There is still a need for road user behaviour to improve, given that 95% of crashes are due to human error.

We have villages who are leading the way in trying to improve road safety. Villages like Great Bealings, Charsfield and Tuddenham adopt a range of measures including vehicle activated signs, community speed watch, entry gates, speed indicator devices (SID) and 30mph roundel signs painted on the roads to remind drivers of the limit.

Witnesham has put together a package of speed reduction proposals, including the use of SIDs and roundels; whilst Debach should have a SID

soon, paid from donations from transport companies. Robin Vickery, Suffolk County Councillor, is proudly supporting SAVID and will be funding a further SID for rotation across villages. The activities of these best practice villages will be used to form SAVID's new strategy.

What's On

Lest We Forget

November 11th, 2018 marks one hundred years since the end of World War One, a dark four years where young men from across these villages left to do their duty, many never to return. To remember the sacrifices given during this conflict, commemorative events are being held across the Grundisburgh News area:



In **Great Bealings** a joint remembrance commemoration with **Little Bealings** is being held in the form of a Beacons of Light festival on 11 November at 7pm. The evening will include a blessing led by Reverend Celia Cook, a BBQ, (hopefully!) a band and fireworks. A detailed programme will be provided nearer the time.

Great Bealings will have one of 1,000 Beacons of Light which will be lit throughout the United Kingdom, Channel Islands, Isle of Man and UK Overseas Territories, with one of the first beacons being lit at Westminster Abbey. More information on the national commemoration can be found at www.brunopeek.co.uk.

St Mary The Virgin Church in Clopton will be holding a 'Poppy Weekend' on 10 and 11 November to mark the centenary of the Armistice. The church will be presenting a special remembrance tribute to local men who were lost in in WWI. Over a thousand poppies will decorate the church, and there will be displays illustrating scenes of WWI. The church will be open all weekend between 10am and 5pm for viewing of the displays. Refreshments will be available.

On Sunday 11 November in **Clopton**, the Remembrance

Service will be held at 11am and in the afternoon there will be a Singalong of WWI songs with refreshments. Proceeds will go to The Royal British Legion Poppy Day Fund.

Tuddenham will also be holding a Remembrance Day Service at St Martins Church at 10.45am on 11 November, with the Royal British Legion in attendance.

Debach and Boulge are holding their annual remembrance service at the Memorial but this year, there will be readings from the war poets. There are also plans to plant an oak tree on Woodbridge Road to mark the occasion. It was originally the site of a Primitive Methodist Chapel, which was converted into a reading room for farm workers. Whilst it is going to take some work to clear the site, it is thought to be a very apt spot for a permanent memorial.

The Remembrance Service at **Hasketon** starts in the church 9.30, then processes to the War Memorial for two minutes silence.

Bredfield Parish Council plans to plant an oak tree in the entrance to the village hall.

In partnership with the parish council and with private donations, St. Mary's Church, **Grundisburgh** will be hosting three 'heroes', opaque figures seated in the pews, amongst the congregation. These will symbolically represent those who gave their lives in the service of others. There will also be a 15-foot cascade of homemade poppies from the west window to the floor.

Contributions of red poppies for the display will be welcomed. These can be made from any material and be no larger than four inches in size, and delivered to the church or to Pat Fletcher (left in her porch at 24 Post Mill Gardens).

Grundisburgh Brownies will be making poppies representing every fallen soldier on the Grundisburgh memorial. They will be made with lolly sticks and paper cupcake cases, with the name of each soldier written on the stick.

News Tribute

Frederick William Archer, February 1925 to January 2018

Fred, nicknamed Jockey
after Newmarket jockey
Frederick Archer, was born
and raised in Charsfield. He
attended Charsfield School
then went on to Wickham
Market School, cycling there
every day.

At 14 he worked on a chicken

farm in Clopton, before going to work for F. Martin at Shop Farm for over 25yrs. It was here he where met land army girl, Myrtle, who became his wife to whom he was happily married for nearly 67 years

until her death in 2015. Their first home was a nissen hut in Manor Road, Clopton, where Philip and Hazel were born. Later they moved to Rouse Hall Estate, and I arrived soon after. This was their home for over 50 years until limited mobility meant moving to a bungalow just yards up the road

In the late 60s, he left Martins to work at the mushroom farm, and later Hubbards engineering. On retiring Fred spent his time gardening although on a smaller scale, taking some of the garden to make a putting green, spending many hours playing golf with his grandchildren. He also spent hours in his shed whittling away making things like mini wheelbarrows

which Myrtle would fill with plants; he loved it if his grandchildren joined him. He would give them bits of wood, nails and hammers and let them create masterpieces.

When not gardening or whittling bits of wood he would have forty winks in the sunshine in the shed doorway. Fred enjoyed visits from his family and took an interest in all they did, and looked forward to great-grandaughter Imogen visiting as she would sit with him and help him with his word search puzzles and to

his weekly visit from his friend Ken.

Fred was proud of all his family and extremely pleased to welcome his youngest great grandson Taylor James into the family a few days after leaving hospital

last June after a serious illness. Despite failing health, with help from carers and my children, I was able to grant his wish to stay in his own home until the end, passing away shortly after being admitted to hospital. Fred is greatly missed by family and friends.

Last chance to comment on the Draft Local Plan

The consultation period for Suffolk Coastal's first draft 'Local Plan' (DLP), which has been running since late July, ends on 14 September. The series of public drop in sessions has been completed but information can be found on line at www.eastsuffolk.gov.uk/suffolkcoastallocalplanreview.

The local plan sets out a strategy for delivering growth in the district for housing and business, and identifies where any development should be located.

Of the villages in The News' catchment area, the plan proposes new site allocations for Otley (two sites 20 +35 dwellings, page 304 & 306 in the draft plan), Charsfield (one site 20 dwellings, page 279), Witnesham Bridge (two sites 20+20 pages 330 and 332), Tuddenham (one site 35 dwellings page 324) and Grundisburgh (one site 56 dwellings page 292).

In Grundisburgh the new site where houses could be built is in Ipswich Road opposite Grundisburgh Hall. The parish council held a special meeting for residents when many objections were raised and led the parish council to vote unanimously to oppose the proposal for the site's inclusion in the draft plan.

Residents are encouraged to comment directly themselves and these can be sent to Planning Policy, Suffolk Coastal District Council, East Suffolk House, Station Road, Melton IP12 2RT or online. There is a recognition that not all speeders are the same and so more than one measure needs to be adopted. The majority of speeders are 'accidental' – distraction means that they haven't noticed a speed limit sign or looked at their speedometer. For these, a reminder from a SID or a roundel will encourage them to slow down. For habitual and high-end speeders, community speed watch and police enforcement, based on data from SIDs, will be more effective at changing behaviour.

It is hoped that a consistent approach across the villages can be adopted and that places like Grundisburgh will resurrect its activities. Speeding is still a major problem and SAVID would like to work with local residents to secure our villages as safer, quieter and more enjoyable environments. Not only would SAVID like drivers to think about their behaviour but they also want residents to get involved.

THE NEW HOME FOR RIDING FOR THE **DISABLED IN CLOPTON**

It was a delight to visit the Woodbridge and District Group of Riding for the Disabled (RDA) at their new site in Clopton. They moved last December onto 24 acres of land leased from the Chamberlain family, for whose support they are extremely grateful.

The site was still being extended and facilities improved when we went there in April so we saw no clients that day. They resumed

teaching in May following training of new volunteers and settling the horses after a difficult winter. All coaches who teach the clients are volunteers and take part in an 'RDA Coaching Pathway to train for that role.

Claire Hinitt, the vard manager, has been with RDA for a year, having previously worked at Otley College coaching equestrian courses as well as coaching at local riding schools.

About 80 volunteers are engaged at the moment, the youngest being 13 years old and the oldest in their eightieth year. Some volunteers are able to offer two or three hours weekly. others can offer three to four days - all are valued and Claire says more RIDGE & volunteers are always needed. "How many staff are employed?' I asked - "One" Claire said "Me"! All jobs from assisting clients to caring for the horses and 'clearing up' after each session are done by the volunteer team.

Suitable horses

The horses most suitable for working with clients - who have a wide range of disabilities - are older and experienced since they are not so easily spooked and are content to stand patiently waiting for however long it takes for a client to mount or dismount. Claire smiles to recall that everyone was a little concerned as to how the horses would cope with the

noise of HRH The Princess Royal's helicopter when she came to open the site last December. They need not have worried - the horses just got

on with their grazing and took no notice of the arrival of royalty.

Although each horse does have its own character they are easy for the volunteers to handle. The horses we saw being put through their

paces by volunteers certainly responded well to the care and praise of their riders. Praise and encouragement for both was generously given by Gillian Gurdon from Burgh

who was coaching the morning's session. Gillian has been associated with RDA for many years - she says she loves it and this is obvious in her approach to her pupils,

both human and equine. She is rightly proud of her '30 year medal'.

Acquiring suitable horses is obviously essential to deliver 'therapeutic riding and carriage driving for disabled people'. Claire says that sometimes

horses are straightforwardly given, some are on permanent loan, volunteers will sponsor a horse and a few are owned by RDA outright - the cost of which could be in the region of



£4,000. Claire said some serious fund-raising will be needed to continue to cover running costs and expand the

centre!

this remarkable charity vary both in age and degree of disability. Clients are accepted from five and the upper age limit is about 60. The riding and carriage driving on offer enable them to develop both verbal and social skills, they learn to trust through physical contact with their horse (patting and stroking are particularly appreciated by visually impaired people) and conversation with the horses and the volunteers! Riding also provides valuable

physical therapy to clients through the strength and balance they develop and the movement of the horse.

Most clients need two volunteers, one to lead the horse and the other as a sidewalker. Half hour sessions, for which each client donates £7, are limited to one per client per week such is the demand for places.

The RDA has a network of branches nationally which offer each other advice and support in what is obviously a highly complicated enterprise which calls for a variety of professional skills, allied with human warmth and empathy.

Forget-me-not clubs are widely established Age UK initiative offering support and social intercourse for people with memory problems and their carers. Locally, there are clubs in

Aldeburgh and Woodbridge, but the club which meets at Nettus Barn, Moat Farm, Otley, is probably unique in offering music and singing in addition to tea and cakes.

The Nettus Barn club is the result of a meeting between barn owner Benedicta Chamberlain who was "wanting to do something to help carers",

Age UK Suffolk's dementia community development officer Vicki Hutchinson and Yula Andrews, a professional musician (on left in photo above).

The club meets on the second Thursday of each month from 2pm to 4pm; the first half of the session is spent with music and singing, and the second is given to tea and cakes and socialising. While the carers appreciate the opportunity to exchange experiences and generally support each other, it is the music and singing which brings the smiles of joy, the energy and delight.

The music is provided by Yula, a musician with a deep conviction of the health benefits of singing, particular group singing. "It brings out the feel good factor, releases endorphins and, as with mindfulness, helps concentration and triggers memory" she says. All that is undoubtedly true but is it is the sheer fun that evokes the response as Yula moves around the group, encouraging animation. I quite expected that someone would stand up to dance.

Yula provides song sheets but most of the members needed little prompting to remember the words and melodies of songs they'd enjoyed in their younger days.

On the day we visited 25 people were there. People come from Ipswich, Martlesham, Woodbridge and many outlying villages. Sessions at the club are free but there is a donation box should anyone wish to use it

Yula also holds a session every Monday afternoon at Nettus Barn designed "just to cheer people up". She says it is for anyone who feels they would benefit. Her enthusiasm for people and music and singing is inspiring. One of her other choirs performed at Latitude recently - and I defy anyone not to respond to the joy which emanates from her music.

FOR THE LOVE OF DANCE

We love to dance - and we love teaching other people to dance. Graham and I are both qualified teachers with the Imperial Society of Teachers of Dance (ISTD). He has been teaching for the last 30 years, myself about 10, and we have both been dancing since our teens - 40 years ago unfortunately!

We both worked our way through the ISTD Medal system as amateurs. I did a double degree as Leader (Man) as well as Follower (Lady). We have recently been accepted to teach on the cruise liners which we are both looking forward to.

We teach Ballroom (Waltz,

The Turks Head is a Free House pub off the beaten track in Low Road, Hasketon. After a six month planning permission process it was refurbished for three years and reopened in 2015. It is owned by Dominic and Jemima Withey who both have business backgrounds.

Inside the atmosphere is an impressive combination of the traditional and modern like one might expect in a boutique country hotel. On entering the pub, a welcome bar with a large fireplace, a shelf with some books and games, a tabled bar area that is easy to either drink or

eat. Walk up some steps to a more obviously restaurant area with local art on the walls. All suggesting a well thought out plan that delivers flexibility of use and invites

guests to use the

pub for any purpose they choose without feeling in anyway uncomfortable that they are in the wrong bit!

The pub aims to be a thriving business and part of the local community. It has won and been nominated for a number of awards – see the website details below. The pub attaches equal importance to good food and drink – particularly beer, placing emphasis on locally sourced and seasonal products.

The head chef, Chandramauli Dwivedi, was trained in French cooking in India and is therefore known for his ability to mix his cooking with cultural twists and whether you order a traditional European dish or one of Asian origin, you are likely to get something special. For the

second year running he has reached the national finals in the Best Chef category for the Great British Pub Award, with the results due in September.


GRUNDISBURGH VILLAGE SHOW ...

Bredfield Fete makes Radio 4



BREDFIELD'S **JUBILEE MEADOW**

rchids galore! That's what would have greeted you on a June walk through the Bredfield Jubilee Meadow and Orchard.

AND ORCHARD

By far the greatest in number were Southern Marsh Orchid – a purple haze of over 200 flowers. Closer inspection would reveal Pyramidal Orchid (photo below), the fancy disguise of Bee Orchid (right), and a few Common Twayblade. Ninety eight species of flora have been identified in our small meadow. With such a biodiversity of flora, an array of insect-life is attendant.

Butterflies to be seen include: Comma, Ringlet, Speckled Wood, Gatekeeper, Meadow Brown, Small Copper, Common Blue, Large Skipper and Essex Skipper. As you

may expect, it's a haven for bees too.

There's no meadow without a mowing. Suffolk Wildlife

Trust helps us manage the meadow for future blooms and this year we were advised to have a mid-summer mowing. Bredfield Jubilee Meadow and Orchard thrives because of its close partnership with organisations such as Suffolk Wildlife Trust and Orchards East

Our next event is our annual

'juicing day'. Young and old from Bredfield will participate in the pressing of our local apples - not yet from the community orchard, but soon.

For a fourth year, we are thrilled to have received a Community Green Flag Award, in recognition that the meadow and orchard is amongst the best green spaces

in the UK. Laurie Forsyth, of the Suffolk Flora Preservation Trust, has declared it to be "a natural history treasure that has survived into

the 21st century".



Hasketon gets knitting





PEACE OF MIND AND SECURITY FOR FREE

The Sir William Brampton Gurdon Cottage Trust, as part of their work, pays for the installation and rental of emergency alarms for 51 Grundisburgh residents. This is a touch-button 'emergency call' service for older and other vulnerable members of the community who may be immobile, frail, living alone, isolated, lonely or afraid. It provides a personal response - 24 hours a day, 365 days a year, offering security and peace of mind to users, family and friends

A special alarm unit is installed in the home and a small push button pendant is provided which may be worn as a necklace or wrist band. On pressing the button, the alarm unit automatically transmits a signal through the telephone line to a response centre where an experienced operator will instantly know who is calling where they are, together with other medical and personal contact details. The alarm unit contains a microphone and loudspeaker enabling two way communication. Even if a person is too far away from the unit to hear, or unable to speak, help will be summoned.

The service for Grundisburgh residents is completely free. To find out more about emergency alarms, or any other part of the Trust's work, please contact me.
