SPEEDING IN VILLAGES

The apparent reduction in traffic volume has led to some motorists putting their right foot down too hard, so Speedwatch and other road safety measures are up and running again.

Suffolk County Council, together with the Police and Crime Commissioner and the Suffolk Roadsafe Partnership, are trialling the use of Automatic Number Plate Recognition (ANPR) cameras to tackle speeding hotspots across the county.

This pilot will run for two years and locations already agreed for Speed Indicator Devices (SIDs) will be considered as possible locations for the trial.

Speedwatch and the SIDS will be popping up at various locations over the coming weeks and months. Regular visits by the Safe Cam enforcement team confirms that excess speed is still a significant issue through villages such Tuddenham. Grundisburgh, Charsfield, Great Bealings and Westerfield are also active in checking speeds.

Frederick Valentine Copping 1927 to 2021

Fred was born and grew up in Charsfield, one of the five children of Mabel and Edward Chopping, a loving happy family.

His first job was as a delivery boy for the local shop, before



working on the land for a local farmer. He was up and out at 5am, often spending long hours

alone on his tractor. But he told me he was never lonely - he enjoyed being on his own, appreciating the countryside and with the satisfaction of delivering a skilled job well done.

He met the girl who became his wife Muriel at a dance in Grundisburgh Village Hall when she was just 16 and he was 19, and would cycle over to Grundisburgh to see her several times a week. They married in her village church in 1955.

Fred realised he now needed to earn more money than farm work brought in, and he took employment with the Jackson civil engineering group. This was obviously another job he enjoyed and to which he again strived to deliver the best he could. His employers found him a "serious grafter who could do the job of six men".

Fred was a keen footballer and in his time captained his village team as a defender. When package holidays opened up travel possibilities, Fred and Muriel took full advantage.

Later they enjoyed family holidays in this country, and always spent Christmas with niece Jane and her family and Muriel's brother and wife, playing cards before going off to midnight mass.

Fred's garden at the corner of Meeting Lane and Orchard End was his passion, a real joy which benefited other garden owners in the village too. He also developed an interest in cooking and until the end of his life produced a fresh meal from scratch every day.

Following Muriel's death, Fred was greatly supported by Baptist Chapel members in Grundisburgh and Charsfield, and he took pleasure in renewing his acquaintance with people and places in Charsfield he had known in his youth.

To this end Fred took on the responsibility for the weekly coffee mornings in the chapel. Every Tuesday morning until lockdown his friend Paul took him to open up, brew, serve and clear up — no half measures for Fred.

He died peacefully on 20 March and his family would like to thank all those who 'rallied round for Fred'. All agree that over his 93 years he touched many hearts.



TUDDENHAM BUSINESS PARK THRIVES

There is definitely a feeling of friendliness around Tuddenham Hall. The new owners of the hall, Jemma Stennett and Adrian Dyter, have not only acquired a beautiful old building but also a small private business park created largely from redundant farm buildings. Most of the units are being used by individuals or husband and wife teams: here is a selection.

Foulgers Dairy

Having delivered milk in Grundisburgh for 17 years as part of the family business, NJ Foulgers and Sons, Adrian had the opportunity in 1999 to purchase the milk round, making door-step deliveries to some 450 customers in the village.

Buying habits have changed since then, with supermarkets now dominating the industry but there is still a market for home deliveries which Adrian has been astute enough to address. He benefited from the decision by the company 'Milk and More' insisting that all their customers' orders are placed on-line. Not everyone has a computer or wants to use the internet and Adrian's customers can still order and pay the milkman traditionally.

The key to success is personal service and giving the customer what she (or he) wants: Foulger's Dairy now has 16 milk rounds plus school contracts across

Suffolk and south Norfolk, operating out of Tuddenham and now also Bungay. His original site at Grundisburgh was too small for expansion so he moved 'head office' to unit 6 at Tuddenham Hall.

All this means he now has 21 vehicles and a staff of 26 delivering not just milk but also eggs, fruit juices, groceries, bird-food and compost. This amounts to some 320,000 vehicle-miles a year with a diesel bill of £1,500 a week! Going electric? The economics don't favour a switch at the moment but it is certainly something Adrian is watching.

For the future, Adrian aims to keep things as local as possible, including his vehicle servicing by Vehicle Surgeon at Hasketon. He wants to remain in control of his business and plans to grow organically - not by debt-laden acquisitions. A sensible approach which has served him well for 22 years.

As part of our commitment to mental health and wellbeing, we hold weekly Forest School lessons for all pupils in our wonderful school grounds, giving pupils the opportunity to learn about different aspects of nature and to take risks in a safe environment. And we continue to link with the Activities Leader at Handford House, a nursing home in Ipswich that has 54 residents with both dementia and physical disabilities.

This is used as part of the

focus for the pupils PSHE and mental health and wellbeing lessons. They understand the type of difficulties that the residents struggle with and have kept in touch with them since summer last year.

This term, the pupils have been looking at how making mistakes

isn't something to worry about and how we can learn that, if something goes wrong, you can make it into something new - or have another go. The pupils created a 'Beautiful Oops' handmade folder, making lovely pictures from mistakes such as coffee cup rings, ink spills and a bit of torn paper.

The 'Beautiful Oops' folder has gone to the home for residents to thumb through or use as a source of an activity. The pupils were also very aware that some of the female residents might not receive a Mother's day card and made some extra beautiful flowery cards to be given out, even to those who perhaps aren't Mums or who might have lost a child

We are all delighted to be back at school together again and are enjoying an exciting summer term of fun learning activities, with an emphasis on learning in the outdoors.

As a school, we see our community welfare and good

wellbeing as central to our ethos and use the Thrive approach as the basis for our pastoral work. Thrive is an emotional and social development programme that can be used across the whole school for whole class, group and individual emotional, social and wellbeing development.

We have a pastoral lead, a mental health first aid lead and two trained Thrive practitioners in our school along with further staff trained to carry out Draw and Talk, Lego Talk, Detsy, Might Mo and other focused wellbeing support programme

Over the last two years, the Friends of Grundisburgh School (FOGS) have offered unswerving support to the provision of these programmes in our school, providing both funds for the completed refurbishment and resourcing of our pastoral or Thrive Room and enabling links to John Lewis who completely redecorated the room for us. It is now a light, colourful and comfortable space for our children to use and we are looking forward to resuming its use for the whole school once Covid restrictions have been lifted.

Wellbeing check-ins

We continue to have weekly wellbeing check-ins for all our children and staff to enable us to continue to support everyone appropriately and celebrate the good things in our lives. Our Personal, Social and Health Education provision is based on the Jigsaw programme which matches our ethos and promotes a mindful approach to wellbeing which our children thoroughly enjoy.

We also have a trained Paws B Mindfulness teacher on our staff along with a bereavement trained practitioner.

Family Thrive

This summer term, we are extending our wellbeing

provision with a member of staff being trained to deliver Family Thrive. Again, with the amazing help and support of funding from FOGS, we have been able to develop our Outdoor

School provision and made it accessible across the whole school.

Thanks to a knowledgeable volunteer, two separate woodland areas have been cleared (one with a pond) and made safe for children to use.

with FOGS successfully applying for grants and providing school with substantial funds for fencing, wildflower plugs, woodland bulbs, a fire pit, cooking equipment, clipboards (to enable work to be carried out outside), tools and many other resources.

Outdoor day

All classes have a dedicated Outdoor School Day when they come to school dressed for the outdoors ready to take their Maths, English, Science or whatever learning outside. The children are really benefitting from learning in the outdoors and look forward to these sessions each week.

In our Arts and Crafts focus week many of the activities were completed outdoors. Children have created colourful wooden poles to decorate the Outdoor School fences, learned about and made Tibetan prayer flags to hang from our trees, designed a giant collage, completed chalk pavement designs, studied the work of various artists and composed work in their style, amongst many other exciting and creative learning opportunities.

Creating a wildflower patch in Bredfield churchyard

Bredfield Parish Council has launched a project to help make the village more wildlife-friendly. Details, and lots of advice and news, are to be found on the village's wildlife friendly website (https:bredfiedwfv.org.uk). Schools will be invited to visit the orchard, for wildlife-friendly learning, once the Covid 19 restrictions loosen.

On Sunday 11 April, the community arranged for a wild flower patch to be dug in the churchyard. Six residents of the village came to dig (following the Covid restrictions). There were three adults and three of the next generation. We dug up a patch of turf towards the back of the churchyard, having been given permission by the Parochial Church Council.

After a light raking and flattening, a variety of wildflower and wild grass seeds were sown. The flower seeds sown where Lady's Bedstraw, Birds Foot Trefoil, Meadow Cranesbill, Knapweed, Selfheal, Tufted Vetch, Yellow Rattle and Perforated St John's Wort. The wild grass seeds sown were Crested Dogs Tail and three varieties of Fescue and Highland Bent.

This large spread of pollinators will attract bees and butterflies in abundance as well as a range of other insects. In future months, we'll be monitoring what comes to the wild flower patch.

Being one of the younger helpers, I am very happy that we have taken a step towards a greener future for the next generation. So please get outside make a wildflower patch of your own, plant some seeds and you will reap the rewards mentally and physically. I know we all need some joy in these COVID times!

Creating an edible avenue along a footpath in Grundisburgh

Walkers along a footpath from Grundisburgh towards Burgh will be encouraged to pick apples fom trees which have recently been planted along a section of the route. Catherine Laxton has so far planted 14 trees either side of the path near its entrance off Woodbridge Road near The Rectory. Several different varieties of apple have been chosen to ensure good pollination – and naturally include Laxton's Superb.

The idea for this came from a visit Catherine paid to Feeringbury Manor in Essex, but she has also been inspired by the writing of famous French chef Raymond Blanc who is passionate about traditional varieties of apples and their preservation.

Elegant name plaques identifying the varieties have been screwed on to the wooden support posts. These were kindly made for Catherine by her neighbour Simon White who has recently moved into Burgh Croft, and were created using pyrography.

Apples were chosen as the best fruit for walkers to enjoy – pears would probably be too hard to bite into and plums attract wasps. Two crab apples have been planted because of their properties as pollinators and one cherry – for the birds to enjoy! The saplings should start bearing fruit in a couple of years.

Catherine and Bryan have lived at Finndale House for the past 12 years. She is a keen gardener and runs the Grundisburgh, Burgh and Culpho Horticultural Society's talks and visits programme and its Hidden Gardens event (details on page 3). Their garden was open under the National Gardens Scheme earlier in May and can also be seen as part of Hidden Gardens.

REWILDING BURGH HOUSE FARM

Jacqui and I bought Burgh House in 2006 which included 35 acres of ancient water meadows. We were able to acquire another 70 acres of arable land from the sstate of Lord Belstead shortly afterwards

Until a couple of years ago we ran our own herd of Red Poll cattle on the water meadows producing our own beef which we sold locally. The arable land was farmed with an arrangement with local farmer only receive support if they perform a public good and improve the environment or encourage biodiversity and wildlife conservation.

So we decided to change the way our small farm operates and over the next few years we intend moving away from an arable rotation towards more grass. We are already working with Lee Byam and his partner Becky Spry who have a herd of Limousin beef cattle and they are interested

The water meadows in particular are rich in wildlife and plants. We have a number of rare plant species including southern marsh orchids and mammals including water voles and otters. Bird life is abundant with nesting barn owls, kingfishers, skylarks and yellowhammers to name but a few

The changes in farming policy by the government mean that farmers will no longer be paid simply to farm their land and the single farm payment system is already being phased out. In the future farmers will in expanding their herd as we increase the area of grassland in the farm rotation.

Unfortunately DEFRA have yet to publish the new farm stewardship scheme but we decided to press ahead with our plans. So this winter we have started by planting 2.5 hectares of woodland in several blocks across the farm supported by the Woodland Trust.

We have divided the big arable fields into a number of smaller fields and planted 1 kilometre of new hedging. Two of the larger woodland blocks have areas for rewilding where we have planted grass and millet for

birdlife and small mammals and wild flowers such as birdsfoot trefoil, vetches and oxeye daisy. Hopefully as the woodland and hedges grow and the rewilded areas establish themselves we will create a thriving habitat for wildlife.

Given the Covid lockdown we were working hard all winter repairing fences restoring hedgerows and replanting the Spooky Wood well known to our dog walkers.

We have also replanted the banks on the edge of the water meadows with native trees with support from the Sicon Foundation a Suffolk based IT company who are keen to provide trees to landowners.

Finally we have seeded a new green lane across the farm which will allow access to all the fields for farm vehicles and moving cattle.

Jacqui and I hope that Burgh House Farm will develop into a special place for wildlife giving even greater enjoyment to us as custodians of the farm and to those who enjoy walking on our public footpaths

However, we do ask that walkers please keep to the public footpaths which will be clearly marked as it is important to maintain the wild areas for wildlife species to become established.

LILY THE LAMB WHO THOUGHT SHE WAS A DOG

Eve Hughes has taken in many animals in need of rescuing over the years — hedgehogs, bats, rabbits - which had to be handfed and reared. But Lily was the first lamb to come into her home.

She had been helping Swilland farmer John Waspe and, when Lily was rejected by her mother, Eve took the three day old lamb back to her home in Grundisburgh and bottle fed her. Soon Lily had become part of the family, forming

close relationships with Eve, Amy the resident dog and the two cats, often curling up on the sofa with them and going for walks around the village each afternoon.

Lily became a familiar sight on these walks, causing quite a few double takes and several queries about what sort of dog she was. But after five weeks, it was decided that Lily was getting too used to being a human – and rather too big for the house.

So she was taken to live with other orphan lambs (she would have been rejected by the original flock after her contact with humans). Eve says she has settled down well and got used to being a sheep again but is really pleased to see her when she visits.

Amy went downhill when Lily first left but has perked up and wags her tail vigorously when she sees her again.

"Lily was very cute. Having her in our home was a lovely experience but she became very demanding" Eve says.

Apart from helping with animals, Eve works with young adults with learning disabilities and a client with dementia. She also runs her own small business making clothing and crafts. This enterprise started because of her love of sewing.

During the early days of Covid, Eve had made over 1,000 masks and other protective items for the NHS. Now, after holding two pop-up shops in December and April outside her home at 4 Rosehill Cottages, Grundisburgh, she hopes to have regular events every four to six weeks. The next will be over the weekend of 12/13 June from 10am - 3pm.

Road safety matters

The safer Village Driving group (SAVID) to which a number of the villages in The News area belong will be meeting next on Friday 18 June at 6.30pm. Details will be confirmed on its website.

SAVID aims to run a shared approach 'campaign' across our villages on speeding and enforcement and plans for this are being prepared. We agreed each village would consider applying for the ANPR (Automatic number plate recognition) cameras system as mentioned above. We are being invited to join the East Suffolk Community Partnership when issues around transport and road safety are being addressed.

Quiet Lanes

As part of Wave 1 of the Quiet Lanes project, a formal notice informing recipients of the intention to designate their road as a Quiet Lane was sent to residents of Meeting Lane,

Chapel Road/Lane, Half Moon Lane, Park Road, Lower Road and the lane in front of St Mary's Church in Grundisburgh.

As a result of this notice, one response was received: from Hopkins Homes' agent. Although supporting Quiet Lanes, they proposed excluding the section of Park Road from Ipswich Road to a point just past the entrance to the proposed development. A reply was sent to Suffolk County Council Highways analysing the response and declining to accept the proposal.

Two roads, not wholly in Grundisburgh, are being progressed in coordination with other parishes. The road between Park Road/Lower Road junction and Bealings (Grundisburgh Road) will be considered as part of Wave 2 of the scheme and Newton Hall Lane will be considered as part of Wave 3.

At Tuddenham, the public consultation and meeting produced valuable feedback of residents' views and those of local cycling and walking groups. The parish council has agreed to put forward Westerfield Lane for possible Quiet Lane status designation. A traffic survey has been recommended by Highways and the outcome of this is awaited.

There were 337 objections submitted to East Suffolk Council in the autumn of 2020 against the proposals by Hopkins Homes to build 80 dwellings on Chapel Field, Grundisburgh.

But the local authorities and the developer didn't listen to common sense. Hopkins Homes submitted revised plans to build 70 dwellings on the same site in February 2021. The access was still from Park Road/Lower Road, there were still no adjacent footways for the existing residents living on those narrow roads, there was still no safe direct access to the village school and centre.

A magnificent further 972 objections were submitted by residents making it very clear that no safe access to Chapel Field is available. nor can be contrived for vehicles, cyclists, pedestrians, equestrians, wheelchairs and pushchairs. Grundisburgh again said NO to Chapel Field.

LOCKDOWN WALKS

ne of the advantages of our lockdowns has been the chance to explore our paths and bridleways. Not being able to play golf or tennis, but badly in need of exercise, Danny and I decided to explore some of the countryside around us. As we were not very good at map reading, we got lost several times at the beginning but are now much better at following the maps and got to enjoy some favourite walks several times.

When we started walking in March last year, the blackthorn blossom had just begun and during the spring we witnessed the cherry, hawthorn and crab apple coming into bloom along with the horse chestnut and, sometimes, it was just a riot of beautiful colour.

In the summer we enjoyed the wild flowers, accompanied by the numerous species of butterflies. Autumn brought us a variety of berries and the amazing colours of the leaves.

During all this time, we were fascinated by the crops in the fields, learning the difference between wheat and barley and a broad bean crop grown specially for cattle food. We envied the farmers able to pursue their task, without any worry about social distancing.

It was amusing to watch the 'gatherings' in Grundisburgh's







Meeting Lane, very aptly named. It seems that so many walks cross this road, so you were bound to meet other ramblers and stop for a social distanced chat.

The local churches have been a godsend for walkers this year too. While most of the buildings were closed, the churchyards remained open

for a spot of respite and even a coffee and cake break, social distancing permitting.

One of our favourites we called the five villages walk, when we start in Grundiburgh and cross the fields to Great Bealings. There we can stop in the church, but usually continue further to Little Bealings'church, where there

are handy benches for a coffee

Then we follow the Fynn Valley valley which takes us to Playford. Crossing over the road, we then continue to Rushmere, arriving near the Baptist Chapel. From there we take the Holly Lane Road, where we go through the woods, then under the railway bridge, before coming out in the Fynn Valley again and heading back to Playford.

At Playford church (top photo) we can stop again and admire the monument to Thomas Clarkson, 1760 to 1846. Thomas Clarkson, the leading anti slavery abolitionist lived in Playford Hall and his family plot lies in the churchyard.

Then we continue on the road between Playford Church and the amazing house, with a blue plaque where the artist, Anna Airy lived and where in the 19th century, her grandfather, Sir George Biddell Airy, Astronomer Royal lived (middle photo).

The road eventually becomes a bridleway and takes us back to the village via Hill Farm and Grundisburgh Hall or via the Millenium Meadow.

In the last lockdown, the churchyards were all covered in snowdrops and later daffodils and primulas. What a beautiful sight for us on our walks!
