Playford village from the air

Playford's Neighbourhood Plan

Playford Parish Council first discussed the possibility of a neighbourhood plan way back in 2015, and in January 2016 held their first meeting to introduce the idea to the residents. There was a positive response and this started a process of talks with East Suffolk District Council and investigations about funding possibilities.

A neighbourhood plan is a series of general planning policies for the development and use of land in the neighbourhood. When properly 'made' it becomes part of the legal planning framework for the designated area. It is a community-led plan for guiding the future development, regeneration and conservation of an area and it enables local people to have a say as to how their neighbourhood grows and develops.

Neighbourhood plans cannot contradict the main government planning policies or the strategic policies in the Local Plan for the area. They cannot propose less development than is planned for in the adopted Local Plan, but they can influence the style of that development.

But rather than concentrating on housing, a neighbourhood plan can have a focus on conservation and protection — and for Playford, it can be used to support the beauty of the Fynn Valley by protecting it.

There are a number of Non-Designated Heritage Assets in Playford which need protecting and also a number of local footpaths which should be conserved for future generations to enjoy. The Suffolk Wildlife Trust's survey completed for Playford, demonstrates the rich variety of flora and fauna in the area.

Parish Councillor Keith Carson stepped forward as chairman of Playford's Neighbourhood Plan and things started to move forward. An online survey was set up on a new dedicated website to ask residents various questions about themselves and what they wanted for their parish - paper copies of this were made available to be completed by those who wished.

A consultant firm was engaged as there were so few volunteers coming forward to help with the enormous amount of work involved. Surveys were completed and boxes ticked. A final draft of the plan was sent to the district council in November 2019 for review and screening, and it was then hoped that by Spring 2020 the

However, the pandemic struck and nothing much happened for a while. Different expectations of progress made during the pandemic meant that the original firm of consultants decided to pull out and had to be replaced. But happily another consultant was engaged and progress resumed in 2022.

Eventually, the final draft of the plan was presented to the village at a meeting in the

> village hall on 18 March 2023 and this marked the start of the six week consultation period during which the villagers were invited to make their comments.

Unfotunately,
Councillor Keith Carson who
had spear- headed the whole
project became ill and was

unable to continue with the last stage of the work. After a tremendous battle with cancer, he sadly died in April 2023 and was sorely missed. We were extremely grateful to him and very proud of the all the hard work he had done for Playford.

After various alterations and additions, the final version was sent to East Suffolk Council for their comments and then on to the Neighbourhood Plan Examiner who gave a favourable report and recommended it should be put to the village for its referendum.

This was held as an official Poll at Playford Village Hall on 13 June 2024. With a 40% turnout, the result of the vote was 79% in favour (with no spoiled ballot papers!) and the plan was home and dry. It then needed to be officially accepted at a full meeting of East Suffolk Council which took place on 24 July 2024.

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Life in Grundisburgh nearly 100 years ago: Keith Burch remembers

Part 2: Trades people and businesses

Despite losing his right hand in the war being replaced by a hook, Sam Dunnett cycled each morning to Woodbridge to collect the post before delivering in Grundisburgh, mounting his bike on a specially made platform on the back. He knew where everyone lived.

There were numerous tradespeople and businesses all over the village at different times, and some of these had post delivered by our intrepid postman.

There were the Pipes, basket-makers, descendants of Ezekiel, with the age-old tradition of weaving sitting on the floor, still going until the 1970s.

Nearby, earlier on, there were the saddlemakers, hence Saddlemakers Cottage.

Opposite the Parish Rooms was the cobbler and shoemender's shop. Starting with the cottages next to The Dog, was Mr Alexander's sweet shop, run by him and his wife; next, Burch the butchers, owned by my grandfather and later by my grandmother; then Borehams the carpenters and in the end house were dressmakers, the Leggetts.

Just up Meeting Lane lived Mr Grey, the first village policeman. We had Nunns the coal-merchant's house with the



coalyard at the back, now called The Bakery (I never knew it as a bakery). Opposite, at the bottom of Rose Hill was Cracknells old Forge, with a building projection housing the original butcher's shop & later a fish and chip shop run by Mr. Ketteringham using a coalfired range. Further down, with

double doors was the slaughterhouse. Edwin Dunnett the wheelwright, worked behind the forge.

Next was another sweet shop! Old Mrs. Foulger ran a bakery in what is now known as Folly Cottage before the family

turned to dairy farming, grazing their cattle on the Green. Later they moved them to a field, now Felgate Way, and led the cows down through the village until the 1990s. Going off The Street, there was The Barley Mow, a beer house, no spirits served, where Joyce Williams was born and it was run by her family.

Facing the Green was Savages, a grocery and hardware store, selling a variety of goods and eventually also the Post Office and Telephone Exchange, now Williams shop.

Ben Cotton was an entrepreneur, running a bus

and taxi service and there were two petrol pumps in the front of the Red House, managed by his two spinster sisters, Rose and Annie. He had a steam engine for 'thrashing' behind his house, and was the first man to own a car in Grundisburgh in 1905!

At the top of Rose Hill there was Gentry's Garage, later Tuckwells, connected to the Cooks. At Pound Corner there was Pound House lived in by the estate carpenters (with a pound across the road for lost animals).

Recently, she made a four-tier wedding cake that was nearly three feet tall! Some bakes have themed decorations and others are simply but beautifully finished with edible flowers.









After 20 years at the Swilland Moon and Mushroom, owner Nikki Gavin who, in her words "has loved every minute running the pub", has decided that it's time to sell and change direction.

At the time of writing, the freehold pub, which incorporates the 'Lunar Cafe', is still up for sale at £375,000. Incidentally, Lunar has rather surprised Nikki: started as a coffee shop, it has morphed into a popular venue for walkers and other interest-groups in the area.

On 'retirement', Nikki is thinking of living in Greece or some other warm place in the winter but coming back to England in the summertime. But not to do nothing: she is considering fundraising for local animal charities, especially for bearded collies and Suffolk Animal Rescue.

Nikki herself is the owner of nine dogs! Whatever the outcome of the sale, the annual dog show will continue as the field is not owned by the pub: Nikki rents it privately and so the show goes on. This year it's on 22 September: details on page three of this issue.

The Grundisburgh Dog lease is still available to purchasers but owners Charles and Eilir Rogers stress that it's still business as usual: their popular quizzes resume on 29 September and on the last Sunday of the month as before. The quizmaster will be Gareth (yes, he of the Turks Head). Their Game Week will be held at the end of November and Charles is about to contemplate their Christmas menu!

The Dog deli closed in Grundisburgh on 31 August and is moving to Woodbridge. Eilir is calling the new shop 'Essen' (as in delicatessen) and aims to repeat her successful operation at the new venue: 23 Market Hill, IP12 8LX (corner of Market Hill and Theatre Street, with parking outside and unrivalled view of the Shire Hall).

She will still champion local producers, with cake from B's Kitchen and Harvey's bread, plus a range of delicious cheeses. The Dog Deli has grown from a plank outside the pub selling perishables during the Covid epidemic to an award-winning feature in the village of Grundisburgh. News from Charsfield Primary School

Here are just a few of the things that we have got up to in the summer term!

Rowan Class embraced the joys of gardening, planting a variety of fruits and vegetables and watching them grow. The children learned about the life cycles of plants, the importance of sunlight and water and the satisfaction of harvesting their own produce.

be realised when I was invited to the Rev. Gary Best's second 'Vicar's Tea Party'.



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Tribute

Terry Frost

16/2/1940 - 18/7/2024

Terry was born in Grundisburgh in 1940 and his early life was difficult in many respects. But being one of ten, there was always someone to pick him up, stick a plaster on his knee, show him how to catch a rabbit...

Terry's family meant the world to him. On leaving school, he had various jobs: jobs that village boys of his generation did - farm work, labouring etc, but having passed his 11+ he had gone to Ipswich High School. After having cycled home from school, the day



didn't end but had only just begun.

There were numerous tasks to do, in a family of 12 post war. He and his siblings were very resourceful – they had to be – their father suffered from shell shock and died young, putting more pressure on a family already under strain.

Having signed up for an extra year of military service, Terry was made a corporal in the RAF and spent most of his time at RAF Wildenrath in Germany. After marrying he and his wife lived in Hoo, before moving to School Lane in Ufford. This was was palatial by comparison – with a bathroom, indoor loo with both hot and cold running water.

In 1972 the family all moved to Grundisburgh, into a brand new council house. The village

was his spiritual home - he became heavily involved in village life, had an allotment, was a school governor and acted in GADS plays, even playing the panto dame. For some years

Terry chaired the Grundisburgh News team.

Terry and all his brothers and sisters had attended the Sunday school at Grundisburgh chapel, a tradition that he passed on later to his own family.

Sundays were something of a whirlwind. After Sunday school, came a roast dinner, followed by a trip to one of the myriad of aunties and uncles, where they were left to play with cousins, while the adults nattered, followed by a sumptuous tea. As they got older, football took over Sundays. He used to ferry his own sons to various places and

stand in the cold and watch. Later he adored his grandchildren, and used to go to the USA to see them.

Terry loved his sport, and took his eldest son Andrew to watch Ipswich town on his fourth birthday, carrying a large homemade wooden crate for him to stand on. Jebba soon followed. They had season tickets for years and rarely missed a game.

Golf later became a passion for Terry, and with other family members he played every Sunday morning and mid-week in the summer at St Audreys. He used to love golf society days out at different courses playing with different people.

For many years Terry worked at what is now Thurlow Nunn, and after redundancy, spent the

> last 18 months of his working life working for his son Andrew, learning a whole new set of skills.

Retirement meant more golf, but also a new career, volunteering to be an 'appropriate adult' for minors

in trouble with the police. He enjoyed this immensely.

Losing his son Jebba in 2019 devastated Terry but he often chatted about happy memories. He went on numerous trips the USA to see his daughter and got into baseball. He had had several health set backs in recent years but bounced back, much to his family's and doctors' surprise. Only minutes before he died Terry was discussing Ipswich Town's new goalkeeper.

SURVIVAL OF THE SWIFTS: CAN YOU HELP?

Over the summer you may have heard and seen swifts screeching high above the village streets, or across the green whilst you sip your drink at the Dog. Maybe you've also noticed oblong bird boxes pop up in prominent locations in Woodbridge and more recently in the village.

Once the sound of summer, sadly their numbers are in decline, with a 60% reduction recorded between 1995-2020, British Trust for Ornithology.

Swifts are often confused with martins and swallows as they are often only seen distant, sometimes in mixed flocks, and swooping at great speeds.



Swifts are the largest of the three species and have charcoal coloured sickle shaped swings.

Whilst they look similar to martins and swallows, they are actually closer related to hummingbirds. Swifts are amazingly adapted to life on the wing and breed, feed, mate and sleep whilst in the air - not landing at all for their first few years of life.



Swallows are unique with long forked tail feathers, and if you see them close up they have indigo backs, red chins and white underneath. House martins are slightly chunky looking, and can be told apart by their white rumps and short forked tail. We also have Sand martins in Suffolk, nesting in sandy banks. Unlike swifts, both swallows and martins build their own nests out of mud.

Swifts are in trouble. They adapted to life in towns and cities where they use buildings as nesting places. However older homes have been draught-proofed and newer building designs frequently leave no space for nesting birds.

Additionally, a threat that is facing both swifts and hirundines (the collective noun for martins and swallows) is the decline in insects.

Across Suffolk many boxes have been put up, including an

impressive new tower at the Eel's Foot Inn in Eastbridge. In Grundisburgh several residents have put up boxes to help support and boost the local population. I put up boxes on my home in March 2023.

We had some interest in late summer by prospecting birds wingbanging the boxes to see if they were occupied then in

they were occupied then in 2024 we were lucky enough to attract a nesting pair.

At the time of writing the swiftlets are chirping from the nest box, begging to their parents for food and we've also seen them wing-stretching preparing for their impending first flight and long migration. They won't be dependent for long as they are likely to fledge any day and then won't touch ground again until they are three or four years of age and are ready to breed.

If you look closely you will see that swift bricks have been installed on the new chapel field development. These bricks can be used by other threatened birds such as house sparrows, also a red listed species in decline.

How can you help?

Please consider putting up a swift box (or two - they are communal nesters) before swifts return back in early May next year. If you'd like advice on siting the box please get in touch. Lawrence Potter is happy to help install boxes - (07860 549366), or contact SOSSwifts for boxes (web page below) or myself (jenny.rawson@outlook.com) for advice.

Alongside somewhere safe to nest, swifts feed on insect prey. Wildlife friendly gardening - not using pesticides or herbicides, leaving some long grassy areas or maybe adding a small pond will all help insect numbers. Jenny Rawson
